Museum of Art and History will display Picturing America, an exhibit prepared by the National Endowment for the Humanities as part of its "We the People" initiative, through September.

The exhibit is uniquely designed to use works by American artists as vehicles through which to explore our nation's history and culture. Its 40 panels display photographs, paintings, quilts, stained glass, architecture and other media by such artists as Winslow Homer, Edward Hopper and Dorothea Lange, among others.

This book gives excellent information on having chickens on the farm. It gives great drawings and explanations for preparing the roost, the necessary elements to keep the flock safe and what will keep these creatures in their fences. It also tells about choosing a breed, feeding, managing for egg laying and meat production, medical issues and even showing your

My favorite part of the book was covered in the section called Fowl Language (pages 29-46). This discussed the voice or expressions of chickens whether they were chicks, hens or roosters. Did you know why hens may crow? This may be because: 1) the hen belongs to the breed type called Longcrowers, 2) there's no rooster in the roost, 3) the hen is getting old or 4) is diseased.
