Song a reminder: God meets us

The Presbyterian congregations in Colby and Hoxie are singing in Italian.

Most congregations are not amused when their pastor tries to teach a new hymn in English, so you can imagine the reception I received when I introduced one in Italian. But I had my reasons. I had learned this short hymn during my visit to the Taize community last April and it became a favorite for me and my husband. We would leave worship humming the tune, and finally, at my husband's insistence, we began to learn the words.

The words are credited to Ambrose of Milan, a church leader in the fourth century. Translated from the Italian the lyrics are: "The Lord restores you. God does not push you away. The Lord comes to meet you." I tried to put the English words with the Taize tune, but couldn't get it to work. So the Presbyterians are singing in Italian.

We are singing in Italian because the words of this hymn, in whatever language they are sung, are important. They are good theology.

How often have you heard, or perhaps even said, "I wonder what I've done wrong for God to be so far away?" or "I've been such a sinner that God left me long ago." The words of this hymn say that isn't the case; I think Ambrose got it right.

God doesn't push us away. We push away God. We find other things in our lives that take priority over God, so that God's presence becomes less and less important. For some God

can even become a nuisance as twinges of guilt nag at us, trying to bring God back into our lives. But we don't think we want God, don't need God, or both, so God begins to disappear. We leave God alone.

Then when trouble happens, when it feels like life is getting out of our control, we can find someone to blame. God. God has pushed me away. God has deserted me. God doesn't care. But God has always cared. God never pushes us away, never deserts us, never abandons us. That's what we have done. God's been with us all the time. We were the ones who didn't care.

God did everything in God's power to show the people of Israel divine grace, power, love and forgiveness, but they stubbornly went their

Political and religious leaders made sure they were well taken care of, while leaving the poor and the ill to fend for themselves. They relied on their own power, rather than trusting

Their philosophy became me first, others

last, and no room for Yahweh. Then, when the enemies conquered the lands of Israel and Judah, it was God who had abandoned them, even though the prophets had preached that they were the ones abandoning God.

God's answer was simple and daring. God came to the people as one of them.

"See. I'm here. I'm one of you. I never left you and I'm not going to now." That was the essence of Jesus' message.

But many were still not convinced, and Jesus' message of love for neighbor, and even enemy, his abundant well of compassion and forgiveness and his life-giving sacrifice were not enough to show how faithful God was, is and will always be. It was not enough to show how close God is willing to come to us, to restore us and keep us eternally near to God's

In Jesus, God came to us and through the Holy Spirit comes to us still, to restore us and give us new life, here, now and forever. God will never push us away. The Lord is always ready to come to us, to meet us where we are. Just as I am is just fine with God.

So - here's the Italian lesson. "Il Signore ti ristora. Dio non allontana. Il Signore nore viene ad incontrati. Viene ad incontrati." Amen.
