# Senate incumbent wins primary

Incumbent state Sen. Ralph Ostmeyer swept to victory in Tuesday's Republican primary, rolling up a 2-to-1 margin over challenger John Miller of Norton and apparently carrying all 14 counties in the reshaped 40th District.

With all precincts reporting, Rep. Ward Cassidy of St. Francis won a battle of incumbents in the 120th House District. He led Rep. Rick Billinger of Goodland by 396 votes.

### Clerk beats out challenger

County Clerk Shelly Harms won by a landslide in Tuesday's Republican primary, keeping her job with 1,158 votes as opposed to the 292 for challenger Cindi

Harms knows she will go back to work as the clerk next year, since there is no Democratic challenger this November.

"I haven't slept in the last couple weeks," Harms said. "I'm so excited right now, I don't know if I'm going to be able to sleep to-

Harms has been the county clerk for eight years. She won the seat in November 2004 from incumbent democrat Tracey Perkins, and was unopposed in the 2008 election.

Still, she said, she took the run by Kriss seriously.

"I'd be silly to say I was not concerned about it," Harms said.
