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Norton campus building open

After years of planning and months of renovations, the new Norton campus building for Colby Community College was dedicated Saturday by President Steve Vacik, nursing students and school, city, county economic development and hospital officials.

The newly-renovated 9,000-square-foot facility at 711 N. Norton Ave. houses the college's nursing program, outreach and adult basic education classes.

The nursing program began in 1969 on the Colby campus. In 1975, it was expanded to Norton in a 2,400 square foot space on the second floor of the Norton County Hospital.

The move into the new facility allowed for expansion of the program from 18 practical nursing students to 30 each year. In addition, an associate degree nursing program started this fall with 10 daytime students. Evening programs were added to accommodate 10 practical nursing and 10 associate degree students, bringing the total number in Norton to 60 per semester.
