NEW YORK - More than an hour after hitting one last shot as a professional tennis player, then delivering one last, voice-wavering

speech to an adoring U.S. Open audience, Andy Roddick exited the locker room one last time. Accompanied by his wife and other family members, a black baseball cap tugged low over his eyes, Roddick slung a racket bag

off his aching right shoulder – the one responsible for so many highspeed aces, violent forehands and the most recent Grand Slam title by an American man – and tossed the equipment in the back of a waiting van.

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
