We're talking about those games where a team shows fleeting moments of brilliance tempered by head-scratching blunders. Where an opponent sticks around long enough to test a team's mettle. Where there are just as many highlights as lowlights to create optimism in the future.

In essence, the kind of game that Kansas played in its season opener.
