A few weeks ago my son and I traveled to San Antonio for our annual "babysit for the granddaughters and let the parents get away" week

When I booked our flight I set the date based on when my son and daughter-in-law were planning on leaving, giving myself a few days to learn the girls' routines and how to get to three different schools and several different soccer fields.

About a week before we were supposed to leave, I double checked the reservations and noticed we were flying on Sept. 11. I wasn't necessarily concerned, but it did cause me to pause for a moment and mutter "hmm." The reservations were made and that was that.

We had an 8:30 a.m. flight, so we arrived at the Denver airport bright and early. As we were settling ourselves in the security line to await our turns at the scanning machine, I heard the sound of bagpipes. Every morning at the Denver airport a color guard made up of Transportation Security Administration screeners marches around the balcony above the floor of the main terminal. A bagpiper is part of the group.

I had seen them before. But this time it was a bit different. Instead of stopping at the bridge that crosses across the middle of the terminal the bagpiper played "Taps" and then "Amaz-

and offering a brief bagpipe concert they came to a stop right above the security area. Then an announcement came over the loud speaker. Your attention please. Please give a minute of silence this morning in honor and remembrance."

At that moment the Denver airport became absolutely still. Those standing shoeless and beltless turned to look at the lowered flag. The woman in the sari lowered her head. Not a complaint was whispered about the delay. I did not hear a murmur of dissent. Nary a chuckle of ridicule. Utter and complete silence. Not even a child's cry was heard.

It is very difficult to remain completely still for a minute, but the silence, the stillness remained for the entire time. Then the loud speaker broke in again with a simple, "Thank you." Yet the crowd remained still as

ing Grace." As the color guard marched away, business as usual began again in the security line, but there seemed to be less noise and more respect among both the security agents and those whom they were screening.

It seemed, for me, that for a minute the world had changed, maybe stopped spinning on its axis for just 60 seconds so that we could all, for just that brief moment, shift our perspective away from "It's all about me," to "We're all in this together."

I remembered the words of Jesus' prayer in John 17:11b - "Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one."

From where I stood in that security line it seemed that at 7 a.m. on Sept. 11, 2012, everyone at Denver International Airport was one.

Amazing grace. Sometimes we actually get to witness it and have the opportunity to experience its power. For one minute I had a brief glimpse into what it means to truly be part of the Kingdom of God. "All is well, safely rest. God is nigh."
