



Heloise Hints from Heloise Chocolate cake holds a surprise

Dear Heloise: I am looking for a cake recipe that I believe has sauerkraut in it. Can you help? Helen D. in New Jersey

Absolutely! Heloise's Chocolate Sauerkraut 'Surprise' Cake is moist and tasty. Just don't tell anyone the "surprise" ingredient until he or she tries it. Gather the following ingredients:

1 1/2 cups sugar

2/3 cup shortening or butter

3 eggs

1 1/4 teaspoons vanilla 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup cocoa

2 1/4 cups flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 cup water or beer

1/2-2/3 cup sauerkraut, chopped, rinsed and drained

Cream together sugar and shortening. Add eggs and mix well. Next, add vanilla, salt and cocoa. Mix together.

In another bowl, sift together flour, baking soda and baking powder. Alternating, add the dry ingredients and the water or beer, a little at a time, to the other batter.

Fold in the sauerkraut by hand. Bake in a greased and floured pan (13 by 9 inches) or cake pans (for a two-layer cake) for 35 to 45 minutes at 375 F. Frost with your favorite frosting (sourcream or cream-cheese frosting is my favorite on this cake). This is one of many recipes available in my cake pamphlet. Let cake cool for about 10 minutes on a wire rack BEFORE you take it out of the pan. Enjoy! - Heloise

P.S.: You can use a box cake mix in place of the dry ingredients for a quick recipe.





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Alert Defense

Declarer may sometimes be able to disguise his overall plan of play, but on most occasions it should be easy for the defenders to see exactly what he is trying to do.

Assume you're East, defending against four spades, and your partner leads the five of diamonds. Declarer wins with dummy's ace and promptly ruffs a diamond. At this point, you should say to yourself that South appears to be laying the groundwork for an endplay, since there can be no other good reason for him to trump a diamond at trick two.

South then draws two rounds of trumps and leads the jack of clubs from dummy. When you 3 duck, your partner wins with the king and returns the club four. Declarer takes your seven with the nine, cashes the ace of clubs, enters dummy with a trump and returns a low heart.

It is not difficult to deduce at this stage what declarer is planning to do. He has clearly gone out of his way to eliminate all the clubs and diamonds from both his own hand and the dummy, and is now obviously hoping to endplay your distinguished partner.

Ordinarily, you would follow low to the heart lead, but under the given circumstances, you should play the queen. If you do, declarer loses three heart tricks and goes down one.

But if you fail to play the queen -- blindly following the general rule of second-hand low --South is sure to make the contract. He will simply cover your seven with the nine, forcing West to win and return a heart or yield a ruff-and-discard. Either way, South finishes with 10 tricks.
