Jorgensen led the Titans in rushing with 83 yards. He scored two rushing touchdowns and successfully converted 3 extra-point attempts. Gfeller rushed for 62 yards; sophomore Jace Jorgenson for 64 yards

and a touchdown; Culwell had 15 yards; and senior Philip Kulas rushed for 8.

Kulas, who kicks for the Titans, successfully split

On the defensive side, the Titans held the Bulldogs to just 188 yards rushing. Leading in tackles was junior Seth Smith, followed by Schmidt, Culwell, junior Rook Shaw and Nathan Jorgensen. Junior Tony Aguilar and Jace Jorgensen also contributed. Smith and Culwell each managed to penetrate the backfield and sack the Bulldog quarterback. Helping out the winning effort with pass interceptions were senior Dan Brown and the Jorgensen brothers.

The Titans led 31-8 at halftime, but the Bulldogs mounted a comeback in the second half, scoring 14 in both the third and fourth quarters. However, the Titans prevailed and managed to stay ahead of the Bulldogs, and as the game ended, the fans rushed the field to congratulate the victorious Titans.

Players of the game were Michael Schmidt, overall and offense, and Nathan Jorgensen on defense.
