The Golden Plains High School football team ended its season with a 2-7 record. However, as the players and coaches reflect on the season, they recalled many successes, both on and off the field.

The Kansas Department of Agriculture is accepting applications for the Water Right Transition As sistance Program (WTAP). The deadline to apply is November 15.

WTAP is a voluntary, incentive-based program de signed to help restore aquifers and streams in critical areas by retiring water rights. Six "high priority areas in the Northwest Kansas Groundwater Manage ment District No. 4 (GMD 4) have been designated as eligible target areas by the Kansas Departmen of Agriculture's Division of Water Resources chief engineer because of significant water level declines The six areas have been determined to be in need o aquifer recovery and are now closed to further water

Applicants who are selected for WTAP grants are compensated by the department's Division of Conservation in exchange for the permanent retirement of water rights on irrigated land

Hunters need permit for chickens

PRATT (AP) - Kansas wildlife officials are reminding hunters they need a new permit to bag prairie chickens this year.

Prairie chicken season opens Saturday, Nov. 17. Until now, Kansas bird hunters who weren't exempt by law only needed a state license to go after the chickens.

But this year they'll need a special permit to hunt both lesser and greater prairie chickens. The \$2.50 permit is available online or wherever licenses are sold.

The Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism says that some permit holders will be surveyed after the season to help the agency learn more about prairie chicken hunters, harvest numbers and distribution.
