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
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Good ideas can outlive their usefulness

That incident in Topeka reminded me of the recent decision by the college trustees to discontinue the Thomas County Tuition Grant, which will end with students who entered college this fall. When the program was authorized in the summer of 2001, it was a good idea that also had financial support.

The college, at the time, received more ctual tuition which would have been gener-

decade, and the concept behind the grants, though still a good one, no longer makes good

It is no secret that the college has been struggling with financial issues for quite some time. (We still seriously need folks with the available means to contribute to the college - shameless plug.) In reviewing our proposed scholarship budgets for 2013-14 from across the institution, we learned that unless we make some significant reductions, over \$1.2 million would be needed to cover scholarships. That figure included the Thomas County Tuition Grant, which totaled around \$300,000 for the current budget year. We needed to cut the total by about a third. The amount of these grants was simply unsustainable, given our limited

college must be a good steward of your tax dollars. So our trustees made a difficult decision to end a program which was simply too expensive to maintain.

Some people have expressed support for the change. Others were upset and have let us know. To both groups, as an employee of the college and as a parent, I understand. However, let me reassure you that even without the tuition assistance, this college is a real value high quality, accessible instruction at a price that is better than most all of our competitors. And for our students, there is a 5-to-1 benefitto-cost ratio on each dollar invested in their education here, according to a recent economic impact study. We will continue to strive to be a first-choice college for the students of northwest Kansas, especially Thomas County.

Let me conclude by congratulating the men's and women's cross-country teams and their coaches, James Ortiz and Crystal Berndt. Both won division titles in the Jayhawk Conference, with the men's team winning the regional title and Coach Ortiz winning the Coach of the Year award. Great job!

The volleyball team just completed a successful season, so congratulations to those student-athletes and coaches. Finally, don't forget basketball and wrestling begin this month.
