Old hospital nominated for register of historic places

"These thing are in the process right now," Quigley said. "I know the public is anxious with this and we're anxious to get started as well."

State and federal tax credits for preserving a historic building can be applied to the hospital, Martin said.

The federal credit covers up to 20 percent of construction costs and the state credit up to 25 percent, and they only apply to the costs of working on the building itself. Both of them require a building to be on the National Register.

The requirements for the federal credit, which is run through the National Park Service, are more rigorous. It requires a project to cost over \$5,000, be income-producing and meet a set of 10 government standards to keep the building as close to the condition it was in before renovation as possible.

"We look not only at it's history, but how much of it is intact," Martin said of the federal tax credmuch of that as possible."

The nomination for the building was submitted to the Kansas Historic Society on July 6 by Spencer Preservation, a preservation consulting company based in Wamego. Brenda Spencer, who owns the company, started looking at the building

in May. She said that it is very rare for a building nominated for the national register not to be ap-

"I was very excited about working on it just because it does retain some integrity," Spencer

The original building was constructed in 1941 through the Works Progress Administration, using brick that had been part of an old high school at the site. It was designed by Joseph Radotinsky, an architect who worked on many such buildings in western Kansas, including the high school in Oberlin. Spencer described the building style as being partially progressive and partially modernist, two architectural styles that were common at

"It's typical of the time in which it was built,"

The building was doubled in size in 1948 when a chapel and a wing for polio patients were added, the features of which are different from the origi-

"That really shows how much the community it. "During the renovation, we aim to maintain as supported it," Spencer said, "and that it was a success in terms of supporting the community.

> Nonetheless, the old hospital was eventually replaced by Citizen Medical Center, which was dedicated in 1982. It was used as an office by the Colby School District in the 1980s and 1990s and some of it was partly demolished later.


