Respiratory risk points to need to get flu shots

What is the most common respiratory illness in the United States, which infects millions of people every year? The answer is influenza.

So the next question is what is best way to prevent flu and flu-

related health complications? The answer is simple – get your annual flu shot. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Thomas County Health Department recommend that everyone 6 months and older get immunized against the flu.

Through the years, the quantity of people recommended for flu vaccination has increased as health experts learn more about the populations that are at the highest risk for flu-related complications. According to estimates, each year over 200,000 people are hospitalized because of flu-related complications. Other locations where the vaccine has been offered are at the mass flu clinic held at the 4-H building, Brewster Senior Center, Rexford Red Barn and sites throughout Colby.

Our local pharmacists have also begun providing the flu vaccine at Palace Drug, Dillons and Walmart. Clinics in town offering the vaccine include Colby Medical Services and Family Center for Health Care. Family Center said they will schedule flu vaccines from 8 to 9 a.m., noon to 1:30 p.m.
