

Frontier freighters to be feature at dinner

Bullwhackers traveled the Kansas frontier, freighting supplies and shaping a profession akin to today's long-haul truck drivers. Traveling the Santa Fe, California-Oregon and Smoky Hill trails, bullwhackers walked beside oxdrawn wagons, courting danger with every trip. Gray will discuss the troubles they faced and their role in the developing frontier.

Jim Gray is a sixth-generation Kansan who co-founded the COWBOY (Cockeyed Old West Band Of Yahoos) Society to promote and preserve Kansas's cowboy heritage through the bimonthly newspaper, Kansas Cowboy. He


