The challenge will get under way Tuesday, Jan. 15, at the Thomas County Health Department, 350 S. Range. Weigh-in will be "come and go" from 7:45 a.m. to 4:45 p.m.

Weigh-ins will be every Tuesday through March 12. Participants will receive correspondence, weekly assignments and reading material via e-mail. The Thomas County Wellness website, www.thomascountywellness.org will also be used for the weekly postings. Provisions will be made for those who need an al-

Weigh-in and assignments are not required, but incentives will be given based on a point system in which points are given for program participation. The final weigh in will be Tuesday, March 12.
