Apple Butterscotch Scones

When I was hostess at the church's Nativi-TEA, several ladies from another church asked me for a recipe for the scones. I didn't have it with me and jokingly said this was the week for my newspaper article; maybe I could include the recipe. They took me seriously, so here it is. - Carol

SCONES

- 2 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon apple pie spice or ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup (8 tablespoons) cold butter
- 3/4 cup fresh apple chopped in 1/2" pieces;
- can leave skin on 1/2 cup butterscotch chips
- 1/2 cup walnuts or pecans (optional)
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup applesauce (unsweetened)
 - **TOPPING**
- 3 tablespoons sugar

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

DIRECTIONS

- 1. In a large mixing bowl whisk together the flour, sugar, salt, baking powder and
- 2. Work in the butter until the mixture is unevenly crumbly. It's OK to let some larger chunks of butter remain unincorporated.
- 3. Stir in chopped apple, butterscotch chips
- 4. In a small bowl whisk together the eggs, applesauce and vanilla.
- 5. Add liquid mixture to dry ingredients and stir until all is moistened and holds to-
- 6. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. (You can used an ungreased pan.) Sprinkle a bit of flour on top of paper or pan.
- 7. Scrape dough onto floured parchment and divide in thirds. Gently pat each into a round circle about 3/4 inch thick.
- 8. To make topping mix together sugar and cinnamon. Brush each circle with milk and sprinkle on the topping.

- 9. For best texture and highest rise place scones in freezer for about half an hour. During this time preheat oven to 425 degrees F.
- 10. After mixture has chilled cut each circle into eight wedges using a sharp knife that has been run under cold water.
- 11. Carefully pull the wedges away from each other and from the center. There should be at least 1/4 inch between each piece.
- 12. Bake scones for 18 to 22 minutes, or until they are golden brown. When you pull one wedge away from another both should look baked through. The edges should not look wet or unbaked.
- 13. Remove scones from pan and cool briefly. Scones are best served warm. They can be wrapped in plastic wrap and stored in the refrigerator for several days. They can easily be reheated by microwaving a wedge for about 15 seconds.

Makes 24 small scones. If larger scones are desired you can divide the dough in half and make only two larger circles. They can be cut into six or eight wedges.
