Because a picture can say a thousand words and they are a great way to keep loved ones informed, we will have a section on how to upload pictures to Facebook. Then to make sure we don't miss anyone's question, there will be a question and answer session at the

and family, is so important you don't want to miss out. Mark it on your calendar, let us know and we will see you March 5.

The other program I want you to start thinking about is Walk Kansas. Yes, it's almost that time again. Walk Kansas starts on St. Patrick's Day, Sunday, March 17, and concludes Saturday, May 11. Team captain packets will be ready for pick up at the Extension Office on Friday, March 1.

For those of you not familiar with Walk Kansas, it is an eight-week healthy lifestyle program that promotes increased exercise and increased consumption of fruits and vegetables. It's easy, inexpensive and lives up to its name – if you use walking for your exercise.

This is how it works: Form a team with six people (things are always more fun with friends), one serving as captain. The team captain or another member can pick up a team captain packet at the Extension Office, 350 S. Range, Suite 16 (Thomas County Office Complex just north of the Armory) or registration materials can be downloaded from our website at www.thomas.ksu.edu. Registration is \$7 a person and includes program packets Communication, especially between friends and weekly e-newsletters with health and fit-

ness tips, recipes and motivational messages. Register your team by 5 p.m. Friday, March 15 – no late registrations allowed.

From March 17 through May 11, team members will log minutes of moderate and vigorous physical activity each day and the amount of fruits and vegetables they eat. They report this information weekly to their team captain who logs it on the Walk Kansas website. Fifteen minutes of moderate to vigorous activity is equal to one mile. The goal is to have each team member exercise or walk approximately 150 minutes a week, the national recommendation, giving the team a total of 423 miles (distance across Kansas) or more by the end of the eight weeks.

At the end of the program, we hold a Grand Finale at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 15, at the 4-H building. At this event we have a light refreshment, recognize top teams - which receive prizes and incentives - and hold a drawing for grand prizes, usually a treadmill and elliptical. To be in the drawing for grand prizes, you must have been on a team that made it across Kansas and be present.

So, start thinking about who you want on your team, talk to them about it, sign up by March 15 and have an extra excuse to enjoy the upcoming warm weather, walking with friends. I'll give more detail in my next column. But for information sooner, give me a call the Thomas County Extension Office 460-




