Boston locked down as manhunt continues

"I had like 30 FBI guys come storm my house with assault rifles," he said. They yelled, "Is anybody in there?" and began searching his house and an adjacent shed, leaving after about 10 minutes.

Authorities gave no details on how Dzhokhar Tsarnaev escaped.

The bombings near the marathon finish line Monday killed three people and wounded more than 180 others, tearing off limbs in a spray of shrapnel.

Chechnya has been the scene of two wars between Russian forces and separatists since 1994 and the conflict spawned an Islamic insurgency that engulfed the region.

Authorities have shed no light on the motive for the Boston bombing.

The endgame — at least for Suspect No. 1 — came just hours after the FBI released photos and video of the two young men at the finish line and appealed to the public for help in identifying and capturing them. Tips came pouring in to the FBI, but exactly how authorities managed to close in on the two was not immediately disclosed.

The men's uncle, Ruslan Tsarni of Montgomery Village, Md., told the Associated Press that the brothers traveled here together from the Russian region near Chechnya.

Tamerlan Tsarnaev had studied accounting part time at Bunker Hill Community College in Boston for three semesters, from 2006 to 2008, the school said.

Dzhokhar Tsarnaev was registered as a student at the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, the school said. The campus closed down along with other colleges around the Boston area.

Their father, Anzor Tsarnaev, said in a telephone

interview with the AP from the Russian city of Makhachkala that his younger son, Dzhokhar, is "a true angel."

He said his son was studying medicine.

The city of Cambridge announced two years ago that it had awarded a \$2,500 scholarship to Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, who was listed as a senior at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School, a highly regarded public high school whose alumni include Matt Damon, Ben Affleck and NBA star Patrick Ewing.

The images released by the FBI depict the two young men walking one behind the other near the marathon's finish line. Richard DesLauriers, FBI agent in charge in Boston, said Suspect No. 2 in the white hat was seen setting down a bag at the site of the second of two deadly explosions.

Authorities said surveillance tape recorded late Thursday showed Suspect No. 2 during a robbery of a convenience store in Cambridge, near the campus of MIT, where a university police officer — 26-year-old Sean Collier — was shot to death while responding to a report of a disturbance.

From there, authorities said, the two men carjacked a man in a Mercedes-Benz, keeping him with them in the car for half an hour before releasing him at a gas station in Cambridge. The man was not injured.

Massachusetts State Police spokesman Dave Procopio said police figured out the carjackers were the marathon bombing suspects in part because of what they said to the carjacking victim. Procopio did not elaborate.

The search for the vehicle led to a chase that ended in Watertown, where authorities said the suspects threw explosive devices from the car and exchanged gunfire with police. A transit police officer was badly wounded, authorities said.

law enforcement facilities to compensate. This allows High Plains personnel to assess patients without the need to take them to a hospital.

"You are to be commended for operating with the restricted resources you have," Commissioner Mike Baughn said.

Hill said High Plains operates under an inter-local agreement where the counties established the agency as a quasi-municipality governed by its founding documents and board members from each county. Thomas County's representative to the board is Larry Struckmeyer.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Adopted a resolution changing the county's policy on closing offices during bad weather. County offices will be considered open unless they are closed by the department heads. When departments are closed, em-

ployees can take vacation time to avoid losing pay during the closure. However, emergency workers such as law enforcement employees and road crews are expected to work during inclement weather.

- Approved a request from Road Supervisor Clair Schrock to trade \$35,883 of federal money for \$32,294 of state funds from the Kansas Department of Transportation.

He said spending the state money would not require the county to comply with the Davis-Bacon Act regarding wage levels or the Buy American Act, as federal money would. The Davis-Bacon Act would increase the paperwork load for projects and require setting wages at "prevailing," or union, levels and providing a weekly payroll, said Steele. The trade gives the county's federal money to the state in exchange for state money that does not have these strings attached and

allows the county to use these funds over multiple years.

- Approved a request from City Manager Tyson McGreer for the county and city to designate a countywide cleanup week May 6 to 10. Baughn and Commissioner Paul Steele suggested coordinating these dates with other cities in the county.

- Approved a request to allow National Rifle Association First Steps and concealed-carry classes put on by Colby Community College to use the law enforcement firing range if the college provides proof of insurance.

- Received a report from the Health Department about March activities, including sending employees to training courses and conducting blood-pressure clinics around the county. The department received new thermometers from the state to monitor the temperature of refrigerators used to store vaccines.

- Approved payments of \$29,332, which does not include the road and bridge or noxious weed departments.

- Heard from Athletic Director Ryan Sturdy, who said the college started the final signing period for spring sports on April 8. He said he began interviews Monday for women's basketball coach and hoped to wrap them up Tuesday.

- Heard from Brooks Wederski, information technology director, who said one of the department's summer projects will be replacing computers in lab 704. Trustee Bill Shields asked if they have a replacement schedule for the computers and Wederski said they don't.

Trustee Arlen Leiker asked what the new computers have that the old ones don't and Wederski said they're almost the

same, but have upgraded versions of programs the students use.

- Heard from Trustee Nick Wells, who also is foundation director. He thanked everyone who attended the "House of Blues" auction on Saturday. He said it set a new record with \$133,000 gross receipts.

For the first time, the foundation will put one-fourth of the auction money into the college's General Fund.
