## Vet tech program wins big award

The Colby Community College Veterinary Technology Program recently purchased some new equipment, thanks to a \$40,000 Excellence in Technical Education award from the Kansas Board of Regents.

The college offers an online option for the program, in addition to a traditional on-campus option, said Debbie Schwanke, the school's public information director, adding that it is the only such program in Kansas accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association. It is also the only veterinary technology program in Kansas to use Adipose stem-cell replacement therapy, Mrs. Schwanke said.

"The college purchased a Companion Class IV therapy laser, an Abaxis VetScan HM5 hematology system and FitPaws physical therapy equipment with the award money," said Dr. Jennifer Martin, program director.

The laser emits photons deep into the tissue of veterinary patients to encourage healing without damaging tissue, said Martin. Since the treatment is often performed by veterinary

pain, acute and chronic conditions, this lets the students gain experience using laser therapy during laboratory classes.

The physical therapy equipment helps dogs strengthen their core muscles, Martins said.

"Canine therapy is a growing field within the veterinary profession," she said. "Students will learn how to perform preand post-surgical rehabilitation, weight-bearing therapy and

The hematology system, an automated analyzer, performs blood tests on veterinary patients.


