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## '14 budget process underway

The Thomas County Commissioners received more 2014 budget proposals at their meeting Friday. The commissioners have not made any formal decisions on budgets yet, but this is the first stage of the budgeting process.

Vicki Hubin of Western Kansas Child Advocacy Center asked the commissioners to give as much as they can but declined to request a specific dollar amount. The county gave \$2,500 to the center in 2013.



## Future police chief recognized by council

The Colby City Council recognized Ron Alexander as the newly chosen police chief at its Tuesday night meet-

"I'm just looking forward to continuing my career in the community and looking forward to serving my community," Alexander said after the meeting.

The council members and other people at the meeting applauded as he was announced as the new hire for the spot. He was hired that same day by City Manager Tyson McGreer and will officially replace the current chief Randy Jones as the police chief on Thursday, Aug. 1, and start transi-

tioning into the job right away. He is a sergeant with the Colby Police Department, having worked his way up over 15 years with the department. He served briefly as the interim police chief last summer when Jones

filled in as the interim city manager. Jones announced his retirement at the May 7 council meeting. He served on the police department for 37 years.
