

Dear Heloise: I bought a bag of miniature marshmallows, which I stored in the pantry. I opened them three weeks later to use, and they were all stuck together in one big blob. It was a sticky mess getting them separated to use in my dessert recipe. How can I avoid this problem? -Ruth F. in Ohio

Just place them in a container with a tightfitting lid, or in a freezer-safe plastic bag, and store in the freezer. Remove from the freezer and let the marshmallows warm to room temperature before using.

If the marshmallows are stuck, pour a little confectioners' (powdered) sugar or cornstarch in the bag and shake to coat. The marshmallows should just break apart. - Heloise

FLAVORED WATER

Many readers add different things to the water to avoid the odor, like lemon slices, but this is the first I've heard of celery! I tested this when cooking some fresh broccoli, and it did seem to help. And then there is my classic hint of setting a bowl of vinegar on the counter and turning the exhaust fan on while cooking odorous vegetables.







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A 90 Percent Solution

A dummy reversal is relatively easy to execute; the only real difficulty lies in recognizing the opportunity to use it. Consider this deal where South is in seven spades and West leads a diamond. How should declarer play the hand?

The most obvious approach is to ruff the diamond and draw two rounds of trumps, hoping they are divided 2-2. If this proves to be the case, the rest is easy enough. Declarer cashes his four club winners, discarding a heart from dummy, and eventually ruffs a heart in dummy to finish with 13 tricks. The objection to this method of play is that it depends almost entirely on finding the trumps divided 2-2, which is only a 40 percent chance.

But the alternative line of play – a dummy reversal -- will succeed about 90 percent of the time and is therefore a much better plan of attack. It allows declarer to make the contract whether the opposing trumps break 2-2 or 3-1.

Accordingly, South ruffs the first diamond high, leads a trump to the eight, ruffs another diamond high and leads a trump to the nine. He then ruffs a third diamond and leads a heart to the king, followed by a fourth diamond ruff and a heart to the ace.

At this point, South has no trumps in his hand, having ruffed four diamonds and led trumps twice. When he next cashes the ten of spades, drawing West's last trump, he at the same time gets rid of his remaining heart and winds up taking the last four tricks with the A-K-Q-J of clubs. That's all there is to it!
