Communities in Rural Opportunity Zone given state money to set up websites for cities, counties

Eight "website scholarships" have been awarded to Rural Opportunity Zone communities by the Kansas Department of Commerce.

The department sponsored the scholarships that pay for community webpages on www.LoveSmallTownAmerica.com and membership in the Love Small Town America network. Four counties and four cities in Kansas were

selected: Ness County, Republic County, Sheridan County and Smith County, along with Bird City, Courtland, Hoxie and Lebanon.

All participate in the Kansas Rural Opportunity Zone program. The awards were made after a competitive application process.

"In the past, our community has not had a strong online presence or a central location for commu-

nity members to find community information," said Julianne Shoup, Sheridan County K-State Extension Agent. "That is what we hope our Love Small Town America sites will become for our community. Our goal was to create a sustainable website that the community interacts with and we are excited to see how it will grow through Love Small Town America."

Webpages for Hoxie and Sheridan County are already online.

The scholarship is designed to provide another tool for communities to recruit new residents by providing a package of webpages to establish a community portal. This opens the door for other community attractions, including businesses, churches, schools, organizations, to have a web presence as well.

Drunk movie fan arrested after driving, quotes 1940s stars

TYRONE, Pa. (AP) – Police say a 78-year-old central Pennsylvania man was doing things "His Way" when they charged him with drunken driving following a fender bender in a parking lot.

The *Altoona Mirror* (bit.ly/1476Rt5) reports Herbert Goss, of Tyrone, would quote only famous lines from Humphrey Bog-

art and Frank Sinatra when they responded to the wreck about 10 p.m. June 18.

When Tyrone Officer Barry Frye tried to question Goss, the suspect allegedly recited Bogart's

famous line from "Casablanca" saying, "Of all the gin joints, in all the towns, in all the world."

Police say Goss segued into Sinatra's "My Way" once it became clear he was in trouble, say-

ing "And now, the end is near, and so I face the final curtain."

Goss says he plans to fight the charges and isn't guilty.

He faces a preliminary hearing Aug. 6.
