

Dear Heloise: A recipe for chocolate brownies appeared in your column years ago. Could you please reprint it? – Brenda H., via e-mail

Absolutely! Here is the recipe for Heloise's brownies from a cake mix. These are more cakelike brownies, but they will do in a pinch and with things you usually have on hand. Grab the following ingredients:

1 egg

3/4 cup water plus more as needed

1/2 cup chopped pecans (optional) 1 (18.25 ounces) box devil's-food cake mix Preheat the oven to 350 F and grease a 13-by-

9-inch pan. In a large bowl, mix together the egg, water and nuts. Add the cake mix and stir well. The batter will be thick; if it is too thick, add a teaspoonful of water at a time to thin it. Be sure not to overmix. Pour into the pan and smooth the top.

Bake for about 20-25 minutes for chewy brownies. If you like them more of a cake consistency, bake for a few minutes longer. Watch them and test for how "done" you like them. 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Too Many Enemies

Sometimes a defender might feel that he has three opponents at the table rather than two. In today's deal, from the 1990 Spingold Teams, East misled his partner in both the bidding and the play, and it eventually cost his team a vulnerable game swing.

North's double was "negative," promising four spades. East's jump to three hearts was pre-emptive and supposedly promised at least four hearts. North-South then lurched to a shaky game in diamonds.

Declarer, the late Edgar Kaplan, won the opening club lead and cashed the king of diamonds. After East's jack appeared, Kaplan successfully finessed dummy's nine and then led a heart to the jack, losing to West's queen.

South won the club return, ruffed a heart in dummy, cashed the diamond ace and led a spade toward his hand. When East followed low, Kaplan finessed the jack, which held. Despite this favorable development, declarer was still in trouble, as dummy had only one trump left to cover his two remaining heart losers, and he had a spade loser as well.

Kaplan now led the heart king, hoping to pick up the ace and ten on the trick, but when dummy ruffed West's ace and East followed low, all legitimate hopes for the contract evaporated.

But the crafty Kaplan was not yet completely out of ammunition, and next played the ace and another spade to East's queen. East's two remaining cards were the king of spades and nine of clubs. South had the heart nine and a trump, while West had the club jack and heart ten.

East now made a critical error, returning the king of spades to force South to ruff. This left West in a quandary, since he could not tell whether declarer's last card was a heart or a club. All West had to go on was his partner's earlier raise, promising four hearts. So West discarded the heart ten, and Kaplan's nine scored the last trick.

East, of course, could have spared his partner any problem by returning the club nine at trick 12. West would have had to follow suit as declarer ruffed, and the ten of hearts would then have taken the setting trick.
