Weather Colby woman in Fireball Run

The 2008 Miss Rodeo America, Amy Wilson of Colby, is teaming with two-time world champion barrel racer Kelly Kaminski for an eight-day, 14-city, 2,000-mile interactive road rally competition known as the Fireball Run.

is scheduled from Saturday through Saturday, Sept. 28.

Participants must figure out clues and complete missions to successfully navigate roadways and score points, all while aiding in the Race to Recovery of America's Missing Children, which calls itself the largest active recovery effort for missing and exploited children in the

Each team is assigned a missing child from their home region and given thousands of posters to distribute along the route while participating in the competition. The agency says it has assisted in the recovery of 39 missing children since its inception in 2007.

Last year, publicists said, Kaminski and her partner were assigned a missing girl from Pueblo, Colo., who was found in August of this year and safely returned to her father.

This year, Wilson and Kaminski will be searching for infor-The rolling scavenger hunt mation on Edward Bryant, who went missing from Monument, Colo., in 2001, when he was 9.

> "I'm really excited to represent the Women's Professional Rodeo Association with Kelly in the Fireball Run," said Wilson.

> "It's heartbreaking to learn of the stories of missing children, so I'm glad I get to help with such a special cause."

Engineers has been very easy to work with as they worked on the building. The school has 210 students enrolled, with 70 in sixth grade, 66 in seventh grade and 74 in eighth grade.
