Can Colby match power with Hugoton? By R.B. Headlev

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Perhaps it's all a clever ploy to surprise Hugoton with 40 or 50 passes tonight — but probably

Because as the Colby Eagles take on another ominous rushing attack, it makes sense to counter with their own classic old-school Oklahoma Sooners gameplan:

Ground and pound.

"We are going to have to establish the run this week," Colby coach Chris Gardner said about the 7:30 p.m. contest. "We need to get the ground game going and string together some good drives."

Annoying roadblocks in Oakley, Scott City and Ulysses jerseys have often stopped Eagle drives through the first three games.
