Now, let me get to more serious business; that of telling you about books. The first is "Please Don't Tell," by Elizabeth Adler. This author grabs the reader in the prologue. She describes the killer's deeds in the first chapter. An emergency room doctor is to be the next victim of this diabolical serial killer.

Protagonist Fenny Dexter is brought in by a strange man covered with blood knocking on her door. Fenny is Viv's grandmother. The plot thickens and the story intensifies.

The next book is "The Execution of Noa P. Singleton," by Elizabeth Silver. Noa has been sitting in jail for the killing of the daughter of Marlene Dixon, and has six months to live when attorney Ollie Stansted is sent to talk with her about a possible appeal.

Ollie tells her Marlene has decided that the death penalty is wrong and that they think they can appeal to the governor. Noa has never appealed her death penalty on the basis of her innocence. In fact, she knows she did it and will not flinch at thinking about the circumstances.

This debuting author and novel shows how Noa is personally acquainted with Marlene and her daughter. Marlene tells Noa that if she tells her about the crime and exposes some of the factors in it, she will get the governor to commute the sentence. The two begin a dialogue and the twists and turns become almost deadly and very unpredictable.
