Trojans nearly swipe win from Lamar

Home game set for Saturday

Zooming into Colby after a 103-point performance Tuesday night, the Lamar (Colo.) Community College Lopers ran into some stronger resistance Thursday eve-

The Colby Community College women held Lamar to 25 fewer points, and were only a missed layup or free throw from scoring their own big win.

If nothing else, this all-freshman Colby team should have something to build on despite the 78-69 outcome.

"Tonight, they grew as a team. I tip my hat to them," new Trojans coach Antowin Edwards said about his first Colby squad. "They played hard against a team with 20 (players) when we had 11. It says a lot about our girls, and it shows what can happen when they listen

What Edwards described as a "helter-skelter" frenetic game didn't mean Lamar could move Colby's Loren Howard from her powerful post position.

Howard delivered an awesome 21 points on 10-of-13 shooting and pulled down 17 rebonds both easily game highs.

Guard Victoria Biddle completed the inside-outside punch with 16 points and just two missed shots (six for eight).

"They (Lamar) will beat a lot of teams," Edwards confirmed. sports coverage on Monday.

"They just beat Dodge City by 18 (103-85) on Tuesday.'

Lamar (2-3 record) built an 18-point lead of 60-42 midway through Thursday's second half.

However, the Trojans' terrific comeback attitude was fun to watch all evening.

Ariel Hutchinson's two baskets ignited a 10-0 Colby run to close within 60-52.

Evans' inside putback and a pair of Deja Cato free throws pulled the Trojans even closer at 61-56.

The Lopers regained a 70-58 advantage, only to see those Trojans rattle off seven more unanswered points.

Biddle's lightning-quick steal and layup made it 70-65 with still nearly three minutes remaining.

"We normally hope to improve about two percent every game," Edwards said. "Tonight, I'd say we improved about 10 percent."

Yet Lamar hit just enough timely shots to survive every Colby flurry. A final Biddle triple from beyond the arc capped that final comeback attempt.

Trojans make great marks

A few more details about four Colby Community College volleyball players who were recently named All-Jayhawk West and All-Region VI following the tournament in Hutchinson:

For the second year in a row, sophomore setter Maisy Munson was selected to the first Team.

Munson, the only setter named to the first team, tallied 1,498 assists this season and 2,586 assists during her time as a Lady Trojan. With 1,498 assists, Munson led the conference and ranked third nationally in assists. She was also first in the confer-

ence and fourth nationally in assists per set (11.10). Munson is also ranked second on the team for aces and had 99 kills, hitting a .268 over the course of the season.

Sophomore Lorena Rosario was also named to the first team after a phenomenal second season in Colby. Rosario led the Trojans in aces this year with 50, ranking her third in the conference and 21st in the nation for total aces.

Rosario was second on the team with 401 kills and a .244 hitting percentage. She is ranked fifth in the conference for kills and third nationally. Rosario totaled 753 kills during her career at Colby and 88 aces.
