The Colby Berean Church has had an Angel Tree up in the church for the last two Sundays, as a way for members to donate gifts to local kids. Todd Murdock, a volunteer who set up the angel tree, said the trees are set up to help Prison Fellowship, an organization that ministers to prison inmates and helps them reunite with their families after

The prisoners come to the organization to get presents sent to their children, Murdock said. Lists go out to local churches, which hang angels up on a Christmas tree with a kid's first name, age, sex and what they

The Berean Church learns what size of clothes a kid needs from their current guardian, and someone in the church takes an angel and buys a present. Then the gifts go to a kid with a Christmas note from their parents, as if the parent had sent the gift.

Around the end of October this year, the church got a list of about 12 kids in northwest Kansas who needed gifts. Volunteers put up two angels for each kid: one for clothing, and one asking for a toy or less-pressing gift.




