
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


Flags fly in remembrance



The array would provide extra power to people in and around Colby through the grid already owned by Midwest, Zwieg said. It would be built on land belonging to Midwest, next to one of the firm's substations.

Midwest customers will be able to "buy" a solar panel for \$984, City Manager Tyson McGreer said, and the energy that panel produces would be credited towards their electric bill.

Customers would be paying for maintenance, insurance and other associated costs along with their solar panel for 25 years, Morley said. Each panel generates 305 watts of electrica single panel would save customers ference ready to write checks.

Postal Service 'fix' another dead end

Taking another tack to revive the moribund U.S. Postal Service, a House committee and majority Republicans have turned down yet another dead end street.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform passed, on a 19-13 party-line vote, a postal "reform" bill that could hurt the service at least as much as it would help.

Its principal feature would be to end door-to-door delivery of mail in favor of either curbside mailboxes for everyone or cluster boxes at the end of a block. The committee, chaired by Darrell Issa of California, estimated the savings at \$2 billion or more a year compared to postal losses of \$1.9 billion in the last three months.

Much of the \$7.5 to \$8 billion loss is accounted for by a mistake Congress made in 2006, requiring the service to prepay retirement contributions to the federal treasury. This burden – something no other federal agency has to do – threatens to sink the postal system, but Congress refuses to remove it – because the money goes to help reduce the federal deficit.

Things actually are looking up a little lately. Postal revenue was up 2.3 percent last year and the package business is bright, but the service is competing fiercely – and successfully against express giants UPS and FedEx.

Ending home delivery might, on the surface, offer the service a chance to at recoup at least some of its losses. However, Chairman Issa's math does not stand up to analysis.

First of all, he's talking about converting something like 1 percent of postal customers a year to street or neighborhood delivery. It's no secret that the Postal Service is nearly out of cash; it might not last two more years, let alone 100.

Then there's the possibility that this radical shift might drive off more business than it saves in costs. Postal customers may well be offended by having to walk to the curb - or to the corner – to get their mail.

And while Rep. Issa touts the cluster boxes, each with its own lock or combination, just like a post office box, as a safe place to leave mail, who will protect customers in rough city neighborhoods who have to carry valuable packages home?

And remember, with First-Class Mail in a tailspin, the service depends more and more on advertising mail and packages to keep afloat. But businesses value home delivery of their ads, and mail-order houses may well switch back to services that do deliver to the door.

Why Issa wants to give the service something it neither needs nor wants is beyond our grasp. We'd like to ask why he's not fixing the obvious problems, especially the huge pension prepayment.

We think Fredric Rolando, president of the National Association of Letter Carriers, summed it up well:

"Lawmakers should fix what they broke, not break what's

But with the Republicans in charge in the House and the Democrats in the Senate, Congress has been unable to pass any postal bill at all the last few years.

Why not try a little common sense and compromise before the whole thing collapses?

Make Veterans Affairs worthy of veterans

Since the Civil War, Americans have gathered each year on Memorial Day to remember the courageous men and women who laid down their lives for our country and express

We gather together to remind our children and grandchildren that because of the sacrifices of our nation's veterans, we have the opportunity to live in the strongest, freest and greatest nation in the world.

As citizens, we have a duty to preserve those freedoms and liberties that generations of Americans gave their lives to establish and protect. We also have a duty to make certain the veterans we are fortunate to still have with us today receive the highest quality and most timely care our country can offer, something they deserve from the Department of Veterans Affairs. Unfortunately, this agency is failing our nation's heroes and thousands of veterans have begun to lose hope in an agency created

We have all heard the recent news reports from across the country of VA staff developing "secret waiting lists" of veterans waiting to see doctors to get around policies on reporting extended delays. Most disturbing is CNN's report that at least 40 U.S. veterans died waiting for appointments at the Phoenix Veterans Affairs Health Care system, many of whom were placed on a secret waiting list. But incidents of mismanagement and even death caused by failures at the agency are far more numerous than what we see on the news.

Every day, Kansans reach out to me to share their troubling experiences. The stories come from whistleblowers, veterans and family members across our state who speak of veterans being disregarded or made to feel like a number – rather than like patriots deserving of care from a grateful nation.

care for chest pains at Topeka's Colmery-O'Neil Veterans Medical Center, and was told the pain was from the muscles around his heart, not a heart attack. Less than a week later, Jack received several stents in his heart at a community hospital to correct severe blockages that caused back-to-back heart attacks. Jack never fully recovered and passed away

One year later, this same Topeka emergency room closed its doors to veterans seeking emergency treatment. I am still waiting for a response from the agency regarding the closure, when it will reopen and claims of neg-

Dave Thomas of Leavenworth recently told me about his appalling experience with the VA claims and appeals process. Dave filed a claim for service-connected disabilities in 1970. This distinguished veteran just received a 90 percent disability rating from the agency – 44 years later.

The Veterans Affairs outpatient clinic in Liberal has been without a doctor for nearly three years. I have inquired with the agency and heard numerous promises that they are senator from Kansas, is a member of the Sen-"close" to hiring a provider. Unfortunately, this is yet another broken promise.

These stories just skim the surface of the struggles Kansas veterans face because of the agency's claims backlog, mismanagement, lack of oversight and difficult environments. Jack Cobos of Topeka sought emergency I have repeatedly raised these issues with the

agency through direct conversations with Secretary Shinseki as well as his staff, but I rarely - if ever - get a response. Veterans are calling for change, yet the agency continues on a glide path of dysfunction.

The department suffers from a bureaucratic culture that accepts mediocrity, leaving too many veterans without the care they need. The culture seems to be more concerned about making their quotas and checking boxes than taking care of veterans. Our veterans deserve better – they deserve the best our nation has to offer. That starts with new leadership.

Two weeks ago, for the first time in my 18 years serving in Congress – both in the House and Senate - I called for the resignation of a sitting cabinet secretary. I did not take this decision lightly. Considerable thought about the state of the department and constantly hearing stories of Kansas veterans being mistreated led to my call for Secretary Shinseki's resignation. Enough is enough. Accountability starts at the top, and there is a difference between wanting change and making it happen.

In the absence of dramatic change, it's clear that we are not prepared for the servicemen and women returning home from Iraq and Afghanistan, and we are not capable of caring for our aging veterans as we promised.

We should not rest until our veterans have a Department of Veterans Affairs worthy of their service and sacrifice.

Parchment paper just too slippery

Dear Heloise: I have a problem with parchment paper. Every time I use it, I cannot keep it on the pan. It slides off so easily, even when I am being careful. Cookies go everywhere. I've tried binder clips, but they pop off. Do you have any hints for preventing this? - Tammy P. in Texas

Here are some hints to try: Cut parchment paper ahead of time and lay between two cookie sheets to flatten. When you need the paper, it should now remain flat while you use it.

Use magnets to hold the corners of the parchment paper while putting cookie dough on it. Just make sure to remove the magnets before baking. Heloise

Mix all ingredients together. Place in a tightly sealed container and store with your other spices (don't forget to label the container!) in a cool, dry place. 

Declarer ruffed, cashed the A-K of trumps and finessed the queen of spades. East took his king and returned a club, but South rejected the finesse, since he had a sure way to avoid a club loser by taking the ace and playing three rounds of spades, discarding a club from dummy. At these tables, declarer made five diamonds.

They would not have succeeded, however had the defense been sharper. At trick one, East should have overtaken the king of hearts with the ace and returned a club. Had he done that, Sout would have gone down one.

It is not an extraordinary feat for East to tak the king of hearts with the ace in order to lea a club. He should assume West's overcall wa based on a five-card suit, which in turn means de clarer has only one heart.


East should count on the ace of hearts and kin of spades as two tricks for the defense and should conclude that his side's best chance for a thir trick lies in clubs. Once this conclusion is reached, it is clear that

clubs should be attacked at trick two, and, obvi ously, that it must be better for the club lead come from East.


