




Defiant gun law difficult to enforce

As political statements go, the Second Amendment Protection Act, which the Kansas Legislature approved in 2013, doesn't bother with subtlety.

It was an act of defiance of the Obama administration's efforts to strengthen gun laws in response to more mass murders than most Americans can keep track of.

Whether the law will ever be enforced is another matter. As for the Second Amendment, it's not in any peril.

The Kansas law declares that the federal government has no jurisdiction over firearms made and sold in Kansas. Further, the law makes it a felony for any U.S. government employee to attempt to enforce federal regulations on Kansas-only firearms, ammunition or accessories. For good measure, the law also prohibits state and local officials from attempting to enforce federal gun regulations involving Kansas-only firearms.

The legislation was a lawsuit waiting to happen the moment Gov. Sam Brownback signed it. And a lawsuit – or lawsuits – won't be cheap. Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt has estimated costs to defend the law at \$625,000.

The first lawsuit came in early July from the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence. (The campaign is named for Jim Brady, who as President Ronald Reagan's press secretary was seriously wounded in the March 1981 assassination attempt on the president.) The issue also has drawn the attention of U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder, who told Gov. Brownback in a letter that, "... a state certainly may not criminalize the exercise of federal responsibilities."

As Kansas lawmakers well knew when they lined up to support the measure, U.S. courts have ruled that states cannot set aside or override federal laws. A federal appeals court last year struck down a Montana law that, like the Kansas statute, applies to a small number of firearms that supporters think don't fall under the federal government's authority to regulate interstate commerce. Like the Second Amendment itself, that authority is in the U.S. Constitution, which asserts the document itself and federal laws are "the supreme law of the Land."

We're not aware of any arrests by Kansas officials of federal employees for trying to uphold the supremacy of federal law over Kansas law on this matter. Perhaps that's because there hasn't been a confrontation. And perhaps that's because the governor and the Legislature fear that an expensive and embarrassing defeat will spoil the fun of thumbing their noses at Washington.

Pacific, Europe claim Colby servicemen

This is the 18th column on the history of the Thomas County Courthouse and the stories of the heroes from Thomas County who lost their lives while serving in the U.S. armed services, continuing the list of those who died during World War II.

This information comes from a book organized by a memorial committee in 1991. Permission to use this material was given by Leland Kindler, a member of that committee.

Lt. Cmdr. Charles Littell was born Aug. 2, 1911, in Thomas County to Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Littell. He graduated from Colby High School in 1931.

Littell learned to fly in Pensacola, Fla., and in 1938 he enlisted in the Navy. He was assigned duty aboard the aircraft carrier USS Wasp. On Sept. 15, 1942, he was killed when the Wasp was torpedoed by the Japanese.

At that time he was survived by his wife Carolyn; his parents; three brothers, Wayne, Arthur and Morris Littell : and five sisters: Mary, Patricia Ann, Mabel, Bertha Mae and Pearl.



Pearl, said to be living in Arizona. A sisterin-law, Mary Ellen Wade, still lives in Colby. There are numerous nieces and nephews in various parts of the country.

Cpl. William L. Gilchrist was born to Mr. and Mrs. James Gilchrist, May 17, 1914, in Rexford.

He entered the service, reporting first to Fort Leavenworth, then to Camp Beal, Calif., for a year, then to Brownwood, Texas. He was finally shipped out in the Headquarters Battery 496th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, 13th Armored Division, U.S. Army.

Gilchrist was wounded in the Ruhr Valley, near Delbrück, Germany, and was taken to the 5th Evacuation Hospital, where he died April 25, 1945. He received the Purple Heart. He was buried in the U.S. Military Cemetery in Germany and later moved to the Netherlands American Cemetery at Margraten.

At that time, he was survived by his wife Marjorie, son William, parents and sisters, and has spent a good deal of that time writing Bertha and Irene.

Tech. Sgt. Lynn Virgil Barnett was born The only one of those surviving today is in Thomas County to Lester and Grace Edelle

Barnett on April 25, 1919. He graduated from the Colby High School in 1937. He was the second son the Barnetts lost in the service to their country in World War II. The other, Tech. Sgt. Samuel L. Barnett, was mentioned earlier.

Lynn Barnett enlisted in the Army Air Corps on Aug. 9, 1940. He was an instructor until 1944, when he trained as an aerial engineer on a B-29. He went overseas March 11, 1945, and was stationed at Guam. While flying a mission, his plane was shot down, and he was killed.

At that time he was survived by his wife Marianna; daughter Marilynn; his parents; sisters Helen and Grace; and five brothers, Vernon, a paratrooper; Morris, in the European Theater; Victor, stationed in Midland, Texas; Wilbur; and Bernard.

Today, Barnett's daughter Marilynn is living in Tampa, Fla. Her four sons, Charles, Donald, Daniel and Joseph, also live in Tampa. His sister, Helen Klein, lives in California, and sister Grace Jones lives in Colby. His only living brother, Bernard (Marian) Barnett, lives in Alabaster, Ala. Sisters-in-law still living are Mildred (Barnett) Green and Anna Mary Barnett, Colby, and Olivet Barnett, Fort Morgan. Colo. There are numerous nieces and nephews in other areas of the country.

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Congress should learn oversight lesson

The crush of demand for Veterans Affairs services in the wake of two wars was easily foreseeable, had Congress been on its toes. Legislators must exercise their oversight responsibilities more diligently, so as to catch problems before they mushroom.

Like other federal scandals before it, the mess involving veterans hospitals has followed a well-trod path. First comes the revelation of misdoing. Then comes the reaction: a shocked public, an administration on the defensive and while ridding the government of shoddy pracgrandstanding members of Congress. Finally, tices. major reform bills get introduced, debated, then put aside when the heat dies down, or the target agency gets more money.

With Veterans Affairs, we're at the reform part of the cycle. The House and Senate each passed their own legislation to fix the healthcare system, including a massive infusion of money to allow veterans to seek private health care. In its rush to address public outrage, Congress is proposing changes that could have benefited from more thorough consideration.

The irony is that this need not have happened – not with Veterans Affairs, nor with the Internal Revenue Service or the Federal Emergency Management Administration, or any of the other cases in recent years where the federal bureaucracy proved to be dysfunctional and Congress rushed in with a half-baked fix. Mostly what is needed is for Congress to do its job properly in the first place.

This means exercising its oversight responsibilities and catching problems before they mushroom. Diligent oversight can repair unresponsive bureaucracies, expose misconduct and help agencies and departments become more effective. A lot of federal employees are doing good work, including at Veterans Affairs; Congress needs to encourage that work

To do this, it first needs to know what's happening. Each committee and subcommittee with oversight responsibility should be keeping track - on a close, even intimate basis - of the department and agencies in its purview. Performance, budget, personnel, management challenges, major and minor problems: members of Congress ought to be experts on them all. They should also listen carefully to their constituents and interest groups focused on the performance of a particular agency, which are often in a position to give valuable information.

Understanding the facts, working cooperatively with the agency and anticipating problems is a far more useful approach than Congress's usual pattern of throwing up its hands at a scandal and blaming everyone else for the problem. The demand for services in the wake of two wars was easily foreseeable. Had Congress been on its toes, it could have prevented what happened.


Congress must also get serious about reforming the federal bureaucracy. It needs to be careful not to indulge in bureaucrat-bashing, but managers do need more flexibility with personnel systems than they currently enjoy. Employees deserve to feel they're being listened to, respected and treated fairly, but management also must have flexibility to hire and fire, and to handle personnel problems proactively. Congress also has to insist that these agencies are training, recruiting and retaining the necessary talent.

These are immense agencies. Veterans Affairs is the nation's largest health-care system. In 2012, it dealt with 83.6 million outpatient visits. Its proposed budget for 2015 is \$164 billion, and it employs more than 300,000 people. This is work on a scale most of us can barely imagine. Mistakes are bound to happen.

This may be an argument for thoroughgoing administrative reform, but it is also a fact Congress can't ignore: if it wants federal agencies to work better, it has to work tirelessly to understand problems and address them before they explode. Does the agency have adequate resources? How can it control bloat and tighten the gap between the people at the top and people on the front line? Are there problems that need addressing right now? Congress cannot eliminate politics from this oversight process, but politics should not drive the whole oversight enterprise.

The point is that many failures of the federal bureaucracy can be avoided with robust congressional oversight. It's a crucial part of improving the performance of government, and Congress has a duty to get ahead of problems, not lag constantly behind. Unless it's willing to accept its responsibility for diligent oversight, the next scandal is only a matter of time.

Bidding Quiz

1. Two notrump. Partner's overcall is equivalent to an opening bid of one notrump, indicating 15 to 17 or 18 points, notrump distribution and at least one diamond stopper. You should therefore raise to two notrump to invite him to go on to three, just as you would have done had he opened the bidding with one notrump.

2. Two hearts. This shows a weak hand with five or more hearts. You are saying, in effect, that two hearts is a safer contract than one notrump.

It is true that there are players running loose 23 in the streets who, having overcalled with one 27 notrump, will turn a deaf ear to your two-heart bid and go back to notrump. The best remedy for this lies not in changing your bidding style, but your partner.

3. Two diamonds. This is clearly a game-going hand, but a major-suit game looks much more desirable than a game in notrump. Accordingly, you cuebid West's suit, asking partner to bid a fourcard major if he has one. If partner retreats to two 37 notrump instead, you will raise him to three.

4. Three notrump. That's what you'd bid if partner had opened with one notrump, and that's what you should bid opposite the notrump overcall. It would be pointless to bid three clubs instead, ostensibly aiming for an 11-trick game when a nine-trick game is available.


5. Four hearts. This is also a game-going hand opposite the one-notrump overcall, but this time your six-card suit is a major, and partner is known to hold at least two hearts. In general, eight-card major-suit fits -4-4, 5-3, 6-2 – are better off being played in the major rather than in notrump, and with your 2-6-1-4 distribution, you should have no reason to believe otherwise.

The best way to get to four hearts is to bid game directly. You could bid three hearts instead, but since you plan to bid four hearts next if partner retreats to three notrump, you might as well bid four immediately.



For the second time in the last three seasons, Kansas State was ranked 21st in the Preseason Amway Coaches Poll released Thursday morning as the Cats were one of four Big 12 teams ranked in the season's initial top 25.

The Wildcats were also ranked 21st by the coaches prior to the Big 12 Championship season of 2012, which was the first time K-State was in the preseason poll since 2004. It is the first time overall Kansas State has been included in the coaches poll since the final 2012 survey when the Wildcats finished the year at No. 11.

Other Big 12 programs joining the Cats in the 2014 preseason poll were Oklahoma (third), Baylor (10th) and Texas (24th). Oklahoma State, TCU and Texas received votes but sit outside the top 25. Additionally, Auburn -K-State's opponent on Thursday, September 18 – checked in at No.

The Wildcats return 39 letterwinners - including 14 starters from last year's squad that tallied an 8-5 record, which included a victory over Michigan in the Buffalo Wild Wings Bowl.


No. 5 Auburn at No. 21 Kansas State, Sept. 18. Tigers' magice ends early, and go Wildcats.
