Many women experience mood swings following childbirth, feeling happy and then tearful, have difficulty concentrating, or trouble sleeping.

The symptoms usually decrease and go away within a few days, but some new mothers experience those feelings for several weeks or more, interfering with their ability to care for the child, themselves and other family members.

National news about the mother in Texas who drowned her five children has brought attention to the topic of postpartum depression.

An estimated 10 to 20 percent of new mothers experience postpartum (postpartum means "after birth") depression following delivery or within a few

Some women don't feel "the blues," or more serious symptoms, until several weeks or months later.

Postpartum depression is believed to be caused by a hormone produced by the body in large doses during the last stage of pregnancy, with most of the hormone flushed from the body during

delivery. After delivery, and before the hormone returns to normal levels, a woman can experience depression and

anxiety. Having someone to talk with about these feelings is important. The new mother also needs to recognize her


