Kansas supporters want blue

LAWRENCE (AP) — Some University of Kansas football fans are seeing red over a conspicuous lack of blue in the school's 2002 football ticket brochure.

The brochure features a photo of new head coach Mark Mangino wearing crimson University of Oklahoma clothing.

Mangino spent the last three years as a coach at Oklahoma, where he helped the Sooners win the National Championship in 2000.

The photo also appeared in the spring prospectus that the university distributed to the media. Some supporters of the university are "a little blue" about the situation.

"That's wrong," said Lawrence business owner Willie Wilkerson. "I would have used a picture from KU."

Doug Vance, associate athletic director for media relations, explained that the main reason for picturing Mangino in Oklahoma garb was that the only pictures taken of the new coach since he was hired were taken at news conferences.

"We wanted a picture that said football," said Vance.

"The brochure was designed before coach Mangino had been on the practice field in Kansas gear, and we didn't have a wide variety of shots to choose from."

Still, some University of Kansas fans are not happy over the use of the photo.

"I think it's ridiculous they put that in there," said Kansas student Aubrey Martin of Wichita. "Something else could have been done."

Brian Hoffman, owner of the Sports Dome in Lawrence, said people should be realistic about the printing deadlines that the university faced in distributing the brochure.

"Even if I was a KU grad and donated \$100,000 a year, I wouldn't be offended by that," he said.

Other fans don't care.

"What difference does it make? He coached somewhere else, and that experience will help the team," said Sally Johnson, a junior at the university.

Swimmers getting along fine with fewer members

Judging by the results at meets, you wouldn't know the Goodland swim team has fewer members than it is used to.

Glenna Jarmin of Edson, coach of the team for over 30 years, says at one time there were 80 to 90 members, but this year there are less than 30.

"When the pool closed for a year, we lost a lot of people," Jarmin said, referring to the summer of 2000, when Goodland closed its public pool because of leaks.

She said the team drove to Colby five times a week to practice that summer, and only about a dozen kids stuck out

the season. The team has rebounded a little since then. Last year, the first year the new pool at Steever Water Park opened, they got a few kids back, she said, and this year even more.

"If we keep it up, we'll be back with some pretty high numbers," Jarmin said.

Not all the new members are still with this year's team, the coach said. The heater at the pool is having trouble keeping the water warm enough for some kids, she said.

"Most of the kids who have stuck around are really dedicated and try their hearts out," Jarmin said.

Daron Roeder, 18, a graduate of Goodland High School this year, said

that Goodland has the second-smallest roster in the 10-team league, but usually finishes sixth or seventh in meets.

"We do pretty well," Roeder said, "considering the size of our team."

Jarmin agrees they do pretty well, especially since Goodland only practices for an hour a day for a few months a year.

"Some of these teams have indoor swimming pools," Jarmin said, "and they can practice all year. We hold ourselves up pretty well."

There are a couple of star swimmers who win most of the points for the team, the coach said, and a couple of kids have gone on to win swimming scholarships.

Rachael Hagerman, who graduated this year, will swim for the University of Maryland.

"There are some good opportunities for swimmers out there," Jarmin said, adding that everyone on the team has a lot of fun.

The swimmers travel out of town for every meet, Jarmin said, because Goodland doesn't hold any tournaments, although it used to. The group swims in the Northwest Kansas League, which also covers eastern Colorado.

"We don't have enough people involved, or enough support, to host a meet," Jarmin said. "Jason Hickson (city/county recreation director) would

like us to, but it will take a lot of work."

Peggy Blake, assistant coach and mother of 15-year-old swimmer Daniel Blake, said playing host to a meet would be good for the town.

"There are a lot of swimmers on each team who would be coming to town," Blake said. "Multiply them by the parents, coaches and friends and you have a lot of people coming here."

Jarmin said she hopes to step down from coaching the team in a year or two. She has been involved since her daughters joined in the 1960s and two grandsons are on the team now.

"It's been a fun time, and we have had a lot of good memories," Jarmin said. "This is a great sport."

10th inning homer wins game

DENVER (AP) — Todd Zeile hit a three-run homer in the 10th inning and the Colorado Rockies outslugged the New York Yankees 14-11 Thursday to close out the highest-scoring three-game series in Coors Field history.

Todd Hollandsworth hit a grand slam as the Rockies overcame an 8-2 deficit, rallying after Roger Clemens was hit in the right forearm by a line drive and forced to leave.

Colorado's use of a humididor to store its baseballs this season had helped drop scoring at Coors Field by four

runs per game from a year ago, but the Rockies and Yankees quickly put an end to that.

The two teams combined for 70 runs, along with 85 hits and 15 home runs.

The Yankees finished with 41 runs at Coors, their most in a three-game series since scoring 42 against the St. Louis Browns on May 3-5, 1951.

Robin Ventura homered in his third straight game, Jason Giambi homered and drove in four runs and Clemens got his first major league RBI.

Giambi also connected in the Yan-

kees' 20-10 victory Wednesday night. New York won the series opener 10-5.

Colorado led 11-9 going into the ninth inning, but Ron Coomer and Jorge Posada hit consecutive run-scoring singles off Rockies closer Jose Jimenez to tie it.

Larry Walker led off the Colorado 10th with a single off Steve Karsay (3-3), then took third on a single by Todd Helton. Zeile followed with his 11th homer on an 0-2 pitch.

Denny Stark (4-1) allowed one hit in one inning to pick up the victory.

Royals' rally too little to beat Expos

MONTREAL (AP) — The Kansas City Royals rallied late and sent the game to extra innings, but it wasn't enough to beat the Montreal Expos, a team slated for possible elimination.

Montreal's Vladimir Guerrero scored on pitcher Scott Mullen's throwing error in the 11th inning Thursday night, helping the Expos extend their winning streak to a season-high seven games with a 5-4 victory over Kansas City.

Fernando Tatis' homer off closer Roberto Hernandez with one out in the ninth made it 4-4, then Montreal went on to put together its longest string since winning 10 straight in June 1997.

"This is awesome — this is amaz-

ing," Tatis said. "Everybody's feeling good. We're winning and we're just putting everything together."

The mood was decidedly less enthusiastic in the Royals' clubhouse as Kansas City lost its season-high seventh in a row despite outhitting Montreal 15-8.

After the Royals overcame a three-run deficit with four two-out runs in the seventh to take a 4-3 lead, Tatis hit a towering shot just over the wall down the left-field line with one out in the ninth.

"I didn't think it would go over the fence because it was too high," Tatis said.

Hernandez wasn't surprised the

drive made it over the wall.

"He's pretty strong and it doesn't take much if you connect on one of my fastballs — I'm supplying most of the power," Hernandez said. "He just happened to catch it on a decent spot and I was kind of hoping that it would curve foul, but it didn't."

Guerrero led off the 11th with an infield single against Mullen (0-2) and advanced to second on second baseman Carlos Febles' throwing error.
