There seems to be a new scam around every corner. One of the latest in town is a check sent by Publisher's Clearing House for people to cash. In order to win the prize the per-

son must send back a portion of the amount of the check, said Darlene Lauer, assistant vice president of First National Bank, last Friday. Lauer said if you win something

from a sweepstakes you don't have to do anything else. You don't have to provide personal information. Pay a processing fee. Call a phone number or anything else. Naturally the check is fraudulent

so it comes out of the customer's account, she said. The person is out the money they send in to collect the larger prize. This latest scam uses both the

Publisher's Clearing House and Reader's Digest name. It claims that the computerized ballots were drawn by Reader's Digest.

One thing to watch for on scams is misspellings in the letterhead and at the bottom of the letter, she said.
