BETTER MAIL SERVICE
Edson and Brewster to Get Papers Earlier
 An improvement in the mail service on which the *News-Republic* and the local postmaster have been working for some time has been approved by the postal department, so that Edson and Brewster subscribers to the *News-Republic* will get their newspapers a day earlier and will have the same service as the towns west.

When the eastbound Jersey ran earlier in the day, the mail carriers on the rural routes waited for its mail, and the newspapers sent on that train were delivered the same day, going out to rural subscribers on Thursday morning.

When the Rock Island made the local train later, the carriers did not wait and did not deliver the newspapers on the routes until Friday. A request was made to the postal department that No. 6 carry the

pouches of newspapers Wednesday night so they could be delivered Thursday, and permission has finally been granted.

Subscribers out of Ruleton, Kanorado and Burlington have always been receiving their Goodland papers Thursday, the sacks for each place being carried on train No. 5, but the east-going papers were not carried on No. 6 and had to wait for the Jersey.

Subscribers in the eastern part of the county and Thomas County have complained of the slow mail service and will be pleased to know that it has been changed. *The News-Republic* is also glad to receive this service from the post office department, for it takes pardonable pride in producing a "news" paper, and delay in delivery detracts from the value of the news because of its lateness.
