

Crowd braves snow to see conservation winners

Huge snowflakes falling by midday on Monday, piling up to about four inches before the sun went down, left Sherman County Conservation District officials wondering how many would attend their annual meeting.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars Hall started to fill a little after 6 p.m., though, and by the time dinner was ready, about 125 had gathered to celebrate 63 years of farm conservation.

Between the dinner and the awards presentations, the Barbershop Connection entertained. The quartet included spokesman Jeff Mason, a Goodland lawyer, Kelly Beek of Cheyenne Wells, Dean Graber of Bankwest and Mel Pfau, a retired banker.

In honor of Valentine's Day, the quartet sang love songs, then some fun songs for the kids in the audience.

Dinner was prepared by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, and bankrolled by the Conservation District, Bankwest, First National Bank, Western State Bank, People's State Bank and Farm Credit Services of Western Kansas.

District Chairman Lonnie Whiteaker thanked everyone for braving the snow.

Sandy Rodgers, district manager, presented the Friend of Conservation award to Danny Farmer, con-

Principals exchange high school, Central

The Goodland School Board approved a job swap by two principals Monday, with Sharon Gregory taking over at Goodland High School next fall and Harvey Swager filling her job at Central Elementary School.

Superintendent Shelly Angelos and the school board made the recommendations after the evaluations for the administrators in a closed session for an hour and a half. Discussions on non-elected personnel are not done in open meeting.

"I'm excited about being at the high school and getting students ready for 21st Century jobs and post-secondary education," said Gregory, who also has been the district's curriculum development coordinator. "I started teaching in high school as an English teacher."

Gregory said she has been teaching since August 1970. She

was assistant principal at Grant Junior High before becoming principal at Central.

Gregory has done curriculum development and statistical assessment for the district, Angelos said.

"She has worn many hats," Angelos said.

"It is definitely going to take me out of my comfort zone," said Swager, high school principal since August 1995. "The image I have is kids coming up to my knees instead of my shoulders. Central has a very good staff."

While no reason was given for the change, Angelos did say the move for Swager was not due to health concerns.

In other administrative assignments, Angelos will remain as superintendent, Don Smith as high school activities director, Steve Raymer as junior high principal, Jim Mull as North Elementary principal and Verna Milnes West Elementary principal.

School to buy three vehicles

The Goodland School Board voted Monday to buy three new two-wheel-drive Ford Expeditions to replace some similar vehicles with high mileage.

Bob Harkins, district transportation director, reported that the low bid came from Dan Brenner Ford for \$24,495 each, or a total of \$73,485 delivered. Herl Chevrolet bid \$93,735 and Finley Motors \$91,556 on similar vehicles.

"We are good shape to start vehicle rotation again," Harkins said, noting that the district had delayed replacing some older vehicles to save money.

The three new white Expeditions should be here in about eight weeks, he said.

Superintendent Shelly Angelos

told board members there will be a third meeting between the district and the Northwest Kansas Technical College about allowing high school juniors and seniors to take classes at the college.

Officials will talk with parents at 7 p.m. Tuesday at the Tech College, she said.

She said one of the board members had asked to see a comparison of utility costs between last year and this year.

She said the bills are running about what had been expected. Electrical costs in general were higher, Angelos said, and electricity and heat were both up at North Elementary School.

Harkins said that fuel costs are running about the same as last year for district vehicles.

Angelos said the proposed calen-

dar for 2007-2008 is similar to this year's. One minor change is that students will go to school on Martin Luther King Day.

The board passed a resolution not to renew the contract of Jeff McCall, a high school math teacher, for next year. This is McCall's first year at the high school and he is not tenured.

In other business, the board:

- Gave permission for a group of teachers to attend a technology conference in Omaha.
- Authorized basketball coach Jon McLean to have practice on Sunday, Feb. 25, to get ready for the substate tournament.
- Approved payment of bills for \$97,637.
- Accepted the resignation from Valorie Grammon, an aide at North Elementary, and Steve Jimenez,

head baseball coach at Goodland High School.

• Hired Sondra Smith and Nichaela Sanchez as aides at North Elementary.

• Hired LaDonna Snyder as an aide at the high school.

• Hired Cleve Trachsel as assistant junior high track coach; Devlin Mull, elementary physical education teacher, as head high school baseball coach; Ben Coats, Traci Price-Waugh and Connie Liven-good as assistant junior high track coaches; Ryan Scheopner and David Avila as assistant high school baseball coaches; Joy Braun and Cody Pettibone as assistant high school softball coaches; and Richard Schwasinger and Dennis Stone as assistant high school track coaches.

City, county, federal offices to close on Monday


