Others at the scene complained to the sheriff, who started an investigation of him and Fire Chief Scott Gilmer. The original theft charge is a level 9 nonperson felony.

On Friday, Feb. 16, Normandin charges reduced to attempted misdemeanor theft.

Hospital staffuses peer reviews, calendars

From janitors to cooks, to nurses and doctors, everyone has to do their job well for a hospital to take care of patients, and Goodland's hospital is taking steps to be sure everyone does.

Goodland Regional Medical Center is working on measures to ensure quality care through peer reviews and calendars for each department that reminds them when to take care of certain tasks.

Departments will have quality assurance calendars in place in the next month, Debbie Hickman, director of patient care services, said at the hospital board's meeting Monday, Feb. 26. Each department will have things on their calendar that need to be done daily, weekly, monthly and annually, she said, and if something is missed, they will have to take steps to correct it.

In the maintenance department, for example, she said, if the humidity falls out of place, they have to make regular checks for the next

In the kitchen, she said, they have to check the temperatures in the refrigerator and freezer every day; that will go on their calendar.

The hospital has been planning to volunteer for an accreditation program that looks not just at whether it meets standards but also how it does so. The program is through the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations, and a committee has been working on ways the hospital can best prepare that keeps a state database of immufor the accreditation.

The hospital plans two mock surveys, one done by a peer, another critical access hospital, the other a more formal survey later this year. The hospital is working on quality monitoring, said Administrator Jay Jolly; there is a lack of standard in the industry.


