Grieve said there will be three age groups for the hunt with those 2 and under, 3 to 5, and 6 to 8.

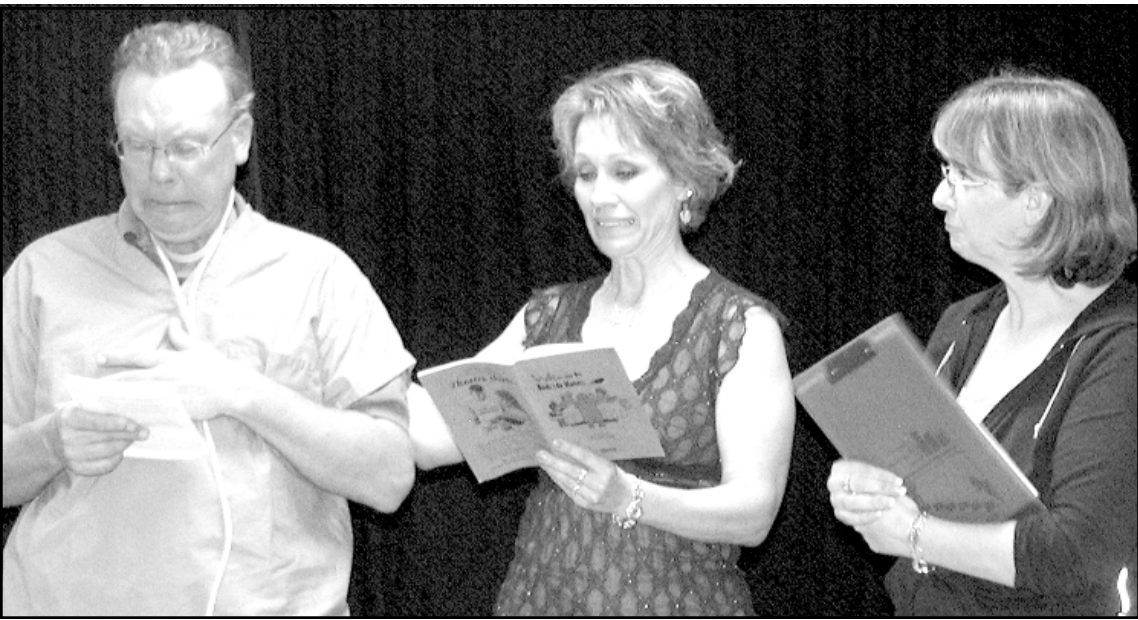
Grieve said she is asking for volunteers to help put the eggs together, and is planning to do that from 2 to 4 p.m. on Sunday at

# Hospital spoof fundraiser for Goodland Arts Council

Food, fun and a hospital? Yes, the Goodland Arts Council's annual dinner theater will entertain with a musical spoof on hospital dramas while the audience enjoys dinner or a dessert buffet.

Tickets are on sale for the musical comedy, "Welcome to Bedside Manor," on Saturday through Monday, April 14 to 16, at the Goodland Elks Lodge. The Saturday show, at 6 p.m., will include dinner, and the Sunday matinee, at 2 p.m., will feature a dessert bar.

The Monday show, at 5:30 p.m., will feature a cocktail hour before the play with hors d'oeuvres. Errington & Errington of Burlington will cater.

Tickets must be bought before Wednesday, April 11, in order to prepare the food for each show. They are available at the Carnegie Arts Center, 120 W. 12th, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday, Sun-

day and Monday.

Tickets for Saturday's dinner performance are \$25 for arts council members and \$30 for non-members. Sunday and Monday's are \$20 for members, \$25 for non-members.

The one-act comedy directed by Judy Hayden features a cast of local talent, said center Director Tina Goodwin. The musical spoof is set in a small private hospital where the staff is as wacky as the patients.

Bedside Manor, Hayden said, is supposed to provide uproarious laughter, a "joke book with thermometers." It's sort of slapstick, she said.

The script is by Tim Kelly with music by Gerry Castle and lyrics by Michael Vigilant.

Dale Schields, director of human resources at the Goodland Regional Medical Center, plays Dr. Jekyll, chief of staff, and Mary Ann Elliott, registered nurse and interim man-

ager of the Goodland Family Health Center, plays Dr. Fred, who belongs in the psycho ward.

Patients include a gypsy (Jessica Cole), first-time parents (Ron and Judi Vignery) and a bum (Frank Avila).

"What kind of hospital is this?" the bum asks. "The only way to get a doctor in this place is to put an ad in the paper."

The rest of the cast are George Adelgren, Marion Armstrong, Sherry Brandvik, Annette Fairbanks, Curt Goodwin, Marlyn Mangus, Stephanie McGinley, Caitlyn McGinley, Michele Preston, Janet Redlin, Jacque Schields, Jeanie Schields, Mary Lynn Smith, Dennie Sorwell, Randy Toppliff and Elwyn Vatcher.

The dinner theater, sponsored by First National Bank of Goodland, is by far the biggest annual fundraiser for the arts council, Goodwin said.

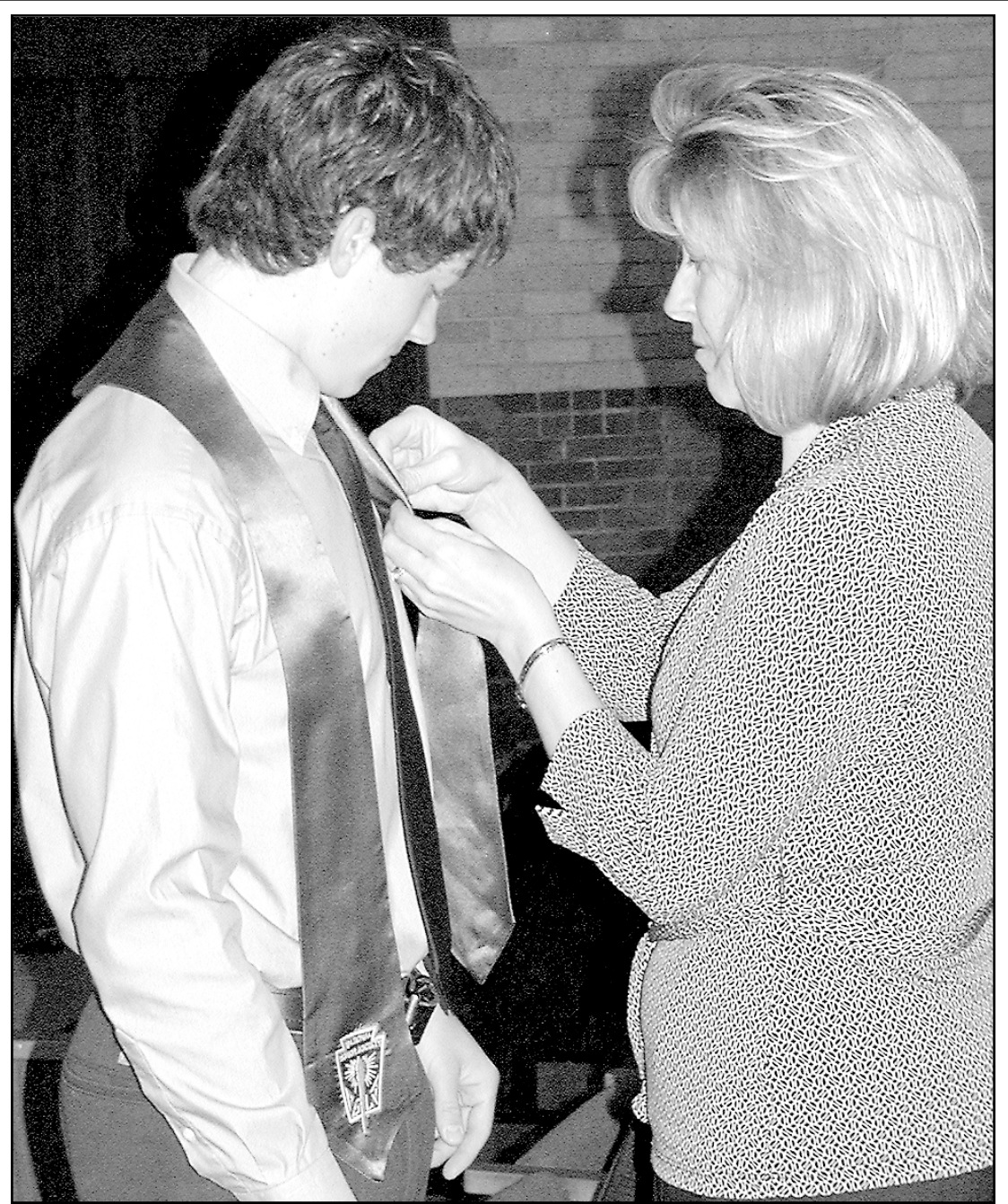
