Selby said he first thought of going to Mexico, but did not have any contacts there.

'My pastor in Salina told me about a man, Glen Pummel, who had lived in Chile for eight years, so I asked Glen if he could help me," Selby said. "Only by God's planning, Glen was going to be traveling to Chile a week and a half after we first discussed my intentions."

Selby said because of the conversation, Pummel was able to speak with some Chileans about hosting him in their home.
