School board chooses president

pjschiefen@nwkansas.com The Goodland School Board reorganized last Monday night at a meeting at the district administration building, choosing long-time board member Dick Short for another term as president.

After swearing in newly elected members John Hendrich and Chuck Wilkens, the board elected officers. Former president Jane Philbrick was elected vice president unani-

Short served as president from 2004 to 2005. Philbrick has been president since then.

Hendrich and Wilkens took the place of Fritz Doke and Marty Melia, who each had served one four-year term on the board.

Superintendent Shelly Angelos told the board the district had completed the fiscal year June 30 and the general fund and local option budget fund had 0 balances. Money for the new year should arrive from the state in about a week, she said.

They transferred all the balances out of general and local to special education and capital outlay because by law they can carry over balances from one year to the next.

She said last year, the district ended the year with \$418,000 in capital outlay and this year it had \$411,737. The balance of the special education fund at the end of the last year \$115,820 and finished this year at \$237,217. Angelos said she was pleased.

The superintendent said Wendy Wellman, community prevention consultant for the Regional Prevention Council, had applied for grants to run the after-school program for the entire year starting after Labor Day and ending the week before school is out. The program had 35 to 40 kids in first through the fourth grade last year, she said.

In other business, the board:
