

# Quilt show will provide satisfaction for passion

If your passion is to sew small pieces of fabric together in a quilt to make a feast for the eye and provide warmth for the soul, the Tri-State Quilt Show in Goodland should fill the bill.

Quilters will meet on Friday and Saturday, July 27 and 28, at the Holiday Inn Express Hotel and Suites. A public showing will be offered at the Goodland High School gym that Friday from 7 to 9 p.m. and Saturday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Events will include workshops with nationally known quilters and an opportunity to shop at a trunk show with booths set up by vendors offering the newest fabrics, patterns, books, kits and more. Other activi-

ties will include tours to area attractions and museums, a golf tournament, high tea, dinner and trip to Tri-State Antique Engine and Thresher Show in Bird City.

Nancy Pallozzi, the organizer for the show and owner of a fabric store in McDonald, said that the event will raise money for ovarian cancer research. To contribute, a quilter needs to make a 12 1/2-by-12 1/2 block using fabric from a the "The Inspiration Collection" by Blank Quilting. The collection has 12 designs, she said.

Blank will donate something for every yard of fabric purchased from area quilt shops and \$1 for every block received. The blocks will be made in a quilt by a group in Denver and given to people in Colorado, Nebraska and Kansas who are suffering

from ovarian cancer, recovered or to the families who have lost someone to the disease.

Instructors for the workshop include Tammy Carlson, Virginia Robertson and Lynn Hagmeier.

Carlson and her company, Happy Hollow Designs, are located outside of Hays. "She is a leader in the pattern companies," said Pallozzi, noting that Carlson's patterns for quilting and crafts are found in many place.

"Virginia (Robertson) has been in the textile industry for over 20 years," Pallozzi said, adding that Robertson started with a quilt store in Overbrook and then joined Fabri-quilt of Kansas City, Mo., to design fabrics.

"Virginia has a passion for reproduction quilts and this passion is passed onto her fabric designs," Pallozzi said. Robertson now lives in Dolores, Colo., but still has family in Kansas. Her workshop will be on the wedding-ring quilt and pot-luck quilt color class.

Hagmeier owns Kansas Troubles and is a fabric designer who lives outside of Salina. She will use her newest fabrics by Moda and participants in her workshop will take home a finished quilted project. Hagmeier plans to teach new concepts and techniques in quilting.

Quilts for the show must be 45 x 60 or larger and at least half of the fabric must be from Fabri-quilt, with a minimum of four different prints including backing and

sashing. The theme of the show is "home on the range."

The show categories will be best group quilt, best individual quilt, most original, best of show, best use of Fabri-quilt fabrics, judges choice and viewer choice. The winner of each category will compete for the best of show.

Fabri-quilt Fabrics of Kansas City, Mo., is giving the grand prize of \$500 for the best of show. Other sponsors are Coats and Clark and Star thread will give \$250 toward the viewers choice award. A Janome sewing machine will be raffled off.

"This event is going to a lot of fun," said Pallozzi, adding that the deadline for registration is Wednesday. To register call (866) 605-0387 or e-mail nemci@aol.com.

# New minister meets with smile

Goodland's new Methodist minister, Kasey Crosby, meets people with a smile and twinkle in his eye.

"This is my second career," said Crosby, an ordained minister for nine years. "I ran from the ministry my whole life."

Ten years ago he was a lay speaker, he said, who filled in for the regular preacher. His plan was to go back to school for ministry.

"That lasted three months," he said, adding that the district superintendent asked him to go to Stafford and serve the church there in 1998. "I had moderate success in Stafford, which has a population of 1,100."

He finished St. Paul's Seminary in Kansas City, Mo., in 2004. However he is finishing his Bachelor of Arts online because he was drafted out of Garden Grove College in California and served in Vietnam.

He was born in Sutherland, Neb., but grew up in Anaheim, Calif.

"I graduated from Rancho Alamitos High School in Garden Grove, Calif.," he said.

He had been a manager in the health care business, including physician recruitment and running a nursing service.

He met his wife, Susan, in Den-

ver. They married in 1995.

Crosby and Susan have two sons, Talison a freshman in Goodland High School, and Aidan a sixth grader. Their names reflect their Welsh heritage, he said, adding that he has always been a student of Celtic traditions and myth.

Clergy are assigned in the Methodist Church, Crosby said. An opening came up in Goodland when the last pastor, the Rev. Janet Hernandez, moved up to district superintendent at the end of July.

Crosby talked about his approach to preaching and ministry.

"I work on my sermon for Sunday until the next Thursday," he said, "then I throw it away. I try to find a new way to address an old story each week."

The preacher said he lets the ideas percolate in his mind until Sunday. His preaching seems more improvisational that way, he thinks.

He said his Saturday evening service at the Goodland church is a real joy and he tries to reach out to young adults. The Sunday morning service is more traditional.

"I don't like boring worship," he said. "My job is to help people experience God in a personal way by being present and delivering the Gospel."
