Goodland poet remembers dragging Main

Memories of dragging Main, and of her husband and children over the years, fill a book of poems written by a 1959 graduate of Goodland High School.

"I wrote this book for my children," Karen Jean Snyder wrote in the preface to the slender volume, "because I wanted to leave them with things I meant to say but lacked the words and wisdom when they were sitting on my lap, when they were growing up and when trouble and sorrow came into their lives."

The former Karen Jean Hull now lives in Gilroy, Calif., the heart of a garlic-growing area south of San Jose. She and husband John have nine children John, Tami, Chad, Shawn, Shane, Andrea, Melinda,

Jonathan and Annette. Her book is year. called "When I Cannot."

Snyder said her parents, Floyd said. and Ruby Hull, owned Hull's Bakery on Main Avenue. Her brother Duane Hull and his wife Harvene still live in Goodland. Hull's daughter Rachael and her husband Kurt Zupko have bought the family home on Sherman Avenue.

"It's really neat to be able to go into the house we were raised in," Snyder said. "My Dad's bakery was the only bakery in town and was a block up from the movie theater."

Snyder said she and her siblings, June Marie, Rex, Duane and Marcia, and their father all attended the all-school reunion in 1996. Their father died three days after returning to California. One sister, Lynn, could not make it. Snyder also was here for the reunion last

"It's a great thing to go to," she back


