William Nelson Marshall

William Nelson Marshall, 93, Orangevale, Calif., former owner of Marshall Radio and Electric in Goodland, who was project manager for NASA Mission Control consoles now in the Johnson Space Flight Center Museum in Houston, died Tuesday, Aug. 28, 2007, at Mercy Folsom Hospital in Folsom, Calif., from complications resulting from a fall.

He was born at the Marshall-Robidoux ranch in Wallace County in 1913 to William Deverter and Alice Eliza (Wolbach) Marshall. Mr. Marshall graduated as valedictorian from Sherman Community High School in 1931. He and Anna Ruth Drum married on Sept. 21, 1939, in Goodland.

He enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1942, working at radio and radar facilities in the Pacific Theater during World War II. After returning, he ran the business here until he moved to El Paso with Philco-Ford to be a trainer on the Nike missile project at Fort Bliss. He transferred to that company's facility in Palo Alto, Calif., where he worked on space projects.

Mr. Nelson and his wife retired to Grass Valley, Calif., in 1971. With his eyesight failing, the couple moved in 1998 to Hazel Creek Senior Apartments in Orangevale, where he loved to play blackjack, poker, cribbage and tinker with ideas for inventions.

He loved to create in-laid game boards, bowls, vases and boxes from exotic woods and hand-carved triple-shot rubber-band guns. His projects won several first-placer ribbons at the county fair.

He is survived by his wife, of Orangevale; three daughters, Carol (Robert) Wilson of Brentwood, Calif., Marsha Rae of Fair Oaks, Calif., and Jan (Michael) Farnsworth of Reno, Nev.; five grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren; and six great-great-grandchildren.
