"Our kids are hungry for another win this Friday and are focused on the task at hand," Coach Jonathan Dansel said. "Starting the season off with a win was crucial as we had to build confidence going into this game."

The Cowboys looked pretty confident last week as they piled up 267 yards of offense against the Buffaloes. Junior running back Fernando Martinez, looked superb as he ran the ball 31 times for 162 yards and a touchdown.

The Cowboys' passing game was also sure of itself, as senior quarterback Travis Angelos completed 2 of 3 passes and fired for 51 yards. Both completed passes were caught by senior wide receiver, Tanner Smith.


