### Flu shots available from county health

Flu shots are again available to about two weeks after the shot. people who want to protect themselves against the flu. The Sherman County Health Department will have a walk-in clinic on Monday to Friday.

Appointments are not required. Medicare and medicaid are accepted, otherwise the shots cost \$18.

Flu shots generally contain killed flu virus and change each year based on what scientists think will be the types and strains of flu for that winter season, said Dorrendo Harrel, director of the health department. October or November is thought to be the best time to get the shots. People can still be vaccinated in December or later. Flu season can begin as early as October and last until May.

Protection from the flu starts illness that are running a fever.

**Dorothy Louise (Dye) Heiny** 

Dorothy Heiny, 96, of Goodland, passed away peacefully at the Hays Medical Center in Hays, Kansas early Monday morning, Sept. 17, 2007. She had been living at the Wheat Ridge Acres assisted living home in Goodland but had recently moved to the Goodland Good Samaritan Society nursing home where she suffered a medical crisis on Wednesday, Sept. 12. She was flown to the Hays Medical Center for treatment, but failed to respond. Her son John Heiny and grandson Michael Heiny were with her during her final days. Dorothy Louise Dye was born on Nov. 22, 1910, in Troy, Ohio. Her parents were William H. J. (Harry) Dye and FLorence Mable (Peart) Dye. Her childhood through high school was spent in Colorado where her father managed hotels in Salida, Alamosa, and Gunnison. She graduated from Gunnison High School in 1927 at the age of 16 and enrolled at Western State College in Gunnison. There she met Lloyd Heiny, a senior majoring in English. Immediately following Lloyd's graduation Dorothy and Lloyd were married on June 19, 1928, in Delta, Colorado. Their first home was in Vona, Colorado, where Lloyd had accepted a position to teach in the local high school. Their first children, Richard and Rosemary, were born while they lived in Vona. In 1940 Lloyd accepted the position of Superintendent of Schools in Arriba, Colorado, and the family moved there. With the children a little older, Dorothy was able to become active in her many interests - painting, quilting, church affairs, and gardening -- she was especially proud of her roses. Throughout World War II Dorothy raised large "Victory Gardens" and supplied most of the family's vegetables. In 1942 Lloyd left teaching to take up selling insurance full time. In 1944 the family moved to Goodland, Kansas, where the opportunities for insurance seemed better. Their son John was born in Goodland. Dorothy actively continued her many interests. She became a serious bridge player, accumulating a number of Master Points but not quite achieving Life Master. She continued quilting and made individual heirloom quality quilts for each of her grandchildren. She was a talented seamstress, and sewed clothes for herself and her children. For many years she was a volunteer at the hospital. Dorothy took up golf at age 60 and played enthusiastically into her early 80s. Dorothy and Lloyd were able to share many vacations with their children in Michigan, New York, Oklahoma and Colorado. In 1970 they took a memorable tour of Europe,
