Senior Martin Stadelmann, a forzerland, finished 93rd in 22:31.13. Junior Justin Verlinden finished 101st in 24:15.91.

"The times were good, but our places were not as good as we would have hoped," said Coach Richard Schwasinger. "It was a tough regional, tough competition."


