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





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
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Goodland soldiers return after year of service in Iraq

Goodland armory staff Soldiers assigned to the Goodland Armory who filled vacancies with the 714th Security Force when it was mobilized for service in Iraq have returned from 12 months of duty overseas.

The 714th Maintenance Company was called to serve in Iraq in April 2006. The unit attended about three months of training at Camp Shelby, Miss., before being cleared for movement overseas.

Advance Party for the unit departed the States the middle of August 2006, while the main body departed on the first of September, arriving in Kuwait on the 2nd, and in Iraq on the 18th. The unit returned to Kansas Aug. 26, and members were greeted by friends and family in Topeka.

Fifteen soldiers assigned to the 714th from the 170th Maintenance Company included seven from the Goodland Armory: Staff Sgt. Ernesto Gonzales, Sgt. Lonnie Guyton, Spc. Cody Boese, Spc. Aaron McClellan, Spc. Kody Sanchez, Spc. Richard Sturtevant and Spc. Bryan Varney.

The 170th Maintenance Company was reorganized last September, transferring Boese to Colby, which reduced the number of Goodland deployed soldiers from seven to six.

When the unit first moved into Iraq, its sleeping quar-

ters were at Forward Operating Base Diamond Back. The base, nestled inside of Mosul and surrounded by buildings and streets, was subject to daily sniper and mortar attacks.

The unit began providing security escort services called Combat Logistic Patrols to convoys moving equipment and supplies in and around Iraq. These patrols took the unit to the northern Kurdish areas and the Turkish border as well as to Baghdad and

During a mortar attack on the base on Oct. 12, 2006, Gonzales and three other soldiers from the 714th were wounded. Gonzales and Spc. Rodney Price were the most critically wounded in the mortar blast and were moved first to Germany and then back to the United States for care and treatment of injuries.

Both soldiers still carry pieces of shrapnel, and Gonzales has limited use of his left arm and some hearing loss from the blast.

The unit moved from Diamond Back to Forward Operating Base Endurance, some 60 miles southeast of Mosul in an area known as "Q-West," by platoon while running continuous missions.


Q-West is on a flat plain that can be easily monitored for signs of an attack. This greatly reduced the risk of sniper or mortar attack and improved the comfort and safety of unit members. It was also from this base that Varney returned Stateside for medical care for non-combat injuries in April.

While in Iraq, the unit frequently took fire from the enemy or ran into situations where there were bombs while escorting convoys. During the tour, the unit provided over 580,000 miles of escort services over convoy routes.

By February, the unit had encountered 105 Improvised Explosive Devises. On the 23rd of July, the unit lost Sgt. Courtney Finch from Leavenworth to non-combat causes, and on Aug. 1, Staff Sgt. Travis Bachman from Garden City was killed by a bomb while conducting a ride-along with the unit that was replacing the 714th.
