18 KILLED INSTANTLY IN WRECK

MANY INJURED; 5 MORE DIE

Rock Island No. 27 Goes Into Ditch Near Clayton Cloud Burst Washes Away

Last Friday morning the whole town was made sad by news of the wreck of westbound passenger train No.27, just east of Clayton, in which 18 persons were killed outright and five received injuries which have since proven fatal.

Among the dead were Engineer J.P. Pickenpaugh and Fireman Wm. Mills of Goodland and J.W. Usher, conductor, formerly of this place but late of Denver, but whose family had come to Goodland for a family reunion of his wife's people were among those instantly killed.

Attorney E.F. Murphy of this town was badly injured and is not yet able to be brought home, and G.D. Breckon, a lineman living here, sustains an injured arm.

The wreck was the result of a cloudburst, which occurred simultaneously with our heavy rain here Thursday night.

Just east of Clayton is a stream bed, which is usually dry. At one time the scene of the

When the water swept down the hollow, it washed off 40 to 50 feet of the fill, and about ten feet of track was turned down into the hollow.

The engine followed these rails into the stream until it ran into the ground up to the top of the pilot, when, in spite of the engineer have turned the reverse lever and the emergency brake, it stopped with a force that sent the smoker (car) crashing through the first chair car within four feet of their full length.

By some inconceivable means Mr. Murphy and two other men were carried from seats in the chair car out on to the roof of the smoker, and part of one body from the same car was found in the machinery of the engine.

Relief parties were hurried from Goodland, Norton, Colby, Philipsburg, and the headquarters in Den-

Drs. Gulick, Smith and Carmithe roof of the chael were called from here as were Rock Island employees all early on the spot to assist in the labor of clearing away the wreckage and recovering the bodies.

> The injured were taken to Norton, where they received the best of care. Undertaker Bower of this city was also early on ground to assist in the care of the bodies.

One of the most pitiable victims of the wreck was a mother who, frightened by the engine beside which her car had come to halt and fearing a fire, had thrown her two-year old baby out into the water where it perished and herself escaped unharmed.

In the coaches back of the first car the passengers were practically unhurt.

The mail and baggage cars were demolished and the baggage man

killed, but the mail clerk escaped. The curiosity and chatting and joking of the crowds of thoughtless

people who gathered from all over the country made the work of the rescuers and friends and relatives of those killed and injured doubly sad and difficult, and it is to be regretted that so many persons were so lacking in consideration and sympathy for those bereaved, yet on the other hand there were scores of big hearted people who lent every assistance in their power in making the terrible blow as easy as possible.

So far only 11 of the victims have been identified.

They are the four railroad employees killed, three other passengers from Kansas, a married couple from Illinois, a gentleman of Ohio, and a Miss Zeigler of nearby Stratton, Colorado.
