_sports Sub-state loss ends season Couple's grandson

slcorcoran@nwkansas.com Goodland's high school volleyball team's season ended with a loss to the Ulysses Tigers at sub-state, but the coach said the girls gained valuable experience they can bring back to the team next year.

They will have more experienced players on next year's team than they had this year and are only losing three seniors, said Coach Jerry McKee. Ten girls earned letters for their hard work this season.

The Cowgirls were knocked out of the sub-state volleyball tournament Saturday, Oct. 20, in Colby, losing to the Ulysses Tigers 25-14, 25-16.

The Cowgirls went in as the No.7 seed out of eight teams with a 4-29 record and faced the No. 2 seed Ulysses with a 20-14 record.

Ulysses beat the No. 3 seed Nickerson 25-18, 25-22 and went on to face the No. 1 seed Colby Eagles. Colby beat the No. 8 seed Russell 25-10, 25-15 and the No. 4 seed Smoky Valley 28-26, 25-20.

The Eagles beat the Tigers 25-21, 25-12, making Colby the 4A substate champions.

"The season was a year of gaining experience and improving our play," McKee said. "We needed to bring several younger players up, and this causes you to weaken your junior varsity and freshman teams.

"Next year we should be in a position of having players ready to play at these levels."

The Cowgirls had a competitive schedule and this year played 11 matches against state qualifiers, McKee said.

"We are always looking to play teams which will challenge us," the coach said. "Each year we reevaluate our schedule and try to find teams which will provide us with the type of competition we are looking for. You will only get better playing teams which provide good competition."

The Cowgirls should return next year with six players with considerable varsity experience, McKee said, whereas this year the team only had two players with any type of varsity experience.

Goodland will have several players who learned and developed at the junior varsity and freshman levels ready to challenge for positions next year, he said; competition for your playing spots only makes your team more competitive.

McKee said but will hopefully pick up several freshmen next year.
