










Two Kanorado men honored



Rod Boyce and Donald Daub of Kanorado received the Citizen of the Year award from the Goodland Elks as well as a Certificate from Sherman County Sheriff Kevin Butts at the Ninth annual Law and Order Appreciation Dinner held in December at the Elks Lodge.

The two Kanorado men were honored for their actions in helping to save a woman's life in September.

The Kanorado men work at the Co-op station, and a woman from Colorado Springs came into use the bathroom while the man she was with got gas. She told Daub, an employee, she had been kidnapped. He told Boyce, the manager, what she said, and the two men tried to rescue her. The man drove off with her in the pickup, and Boyce followed to see which way they went on the interstate while Daub called 911.

Sherman County Sheriff Kevin Butts found the pickup near the east Goodland exit and followed it for about three miles before he pulled it over with the assistance of Deputy Bob Pope. Butts had Pope talk to the driver while he went around the pickup and got the woman out and took her back

The immediate actions were credited by hospital staff with saving the baby's life.













