Cowgirls win one of three in Colby

ntbetz@nwkansas.com The Cowgirls won one of three games at the 23rd Paul Wintz Orange and Black Basketball Classic over the weekend in Colby, but lost to the McCook Lady Bison 63-43 in the fourth-place game on

Thursday, the Cowgirls faced the undefeated Colby Lady Eagles, losing 55-26 at the Colby Community

On Friday, the Cowgirls defeated the Scott City Lady Beavers 55-39 at Colby High School.

Saturday the Cowgirls lost to McCook back at the Community Building, 63-43 to place fifth.

The Lady Eagles kept their streak alive, winning the tournament championship over Wichita South on Saturday, 71-46. The Colby girls, the defending Class 4A state champions, are 13-0 for the season.

The Cowgirls fell behind the Lady Eagles in the first quarter Thursday, but stayed close, down by just 5 at 14-9, after the first quarter. In the second quarter, Colby pushed out to an 11 point lead, 24-13, but even though the Cowgirls went on a short run at the end, the halftime

That was as close as the Cowgirls got. In the second half, the Eagles outscored the Cowgirls 29-6 to win 55-26. The Cowgirls had 6 points in the third quarter and did not score in the final period.

"Our ladies played a good first half against Colby," Coach Don Smith said. "In the second half, the Lady Eagles' experience showed and they made some adjustments and took control."

Friday night at Colby High School, the Cowgirls got a little revenge by defeating the Scott City Lady Beavers 55-39. They lost their previous game in Scott City on Dec.

The Cowgirls got off to a great start and were leading 13-9 after the first quarter. The Cowgirls kept the scoring pressure on, outscoring the Lady Beavers 15-12 in the second quarter to lead 28-21 at half time. In the second half, the Cowgirls

took control, outscoring the Beavers 16-5 to lead 44-26 heading into the final quarter. The Cowgirls kept up the pace to win 55-39.

"The girls played a good game on Friday," Smith said. "We did the things we wanted to do, and I thought we were in good shape going into Saturday's game."

"Friday, we took Scott City out of their offense, and we played good defense and had good rebounding. We executed the best we have the entire year. We shared the ball well and the passing was good. Without a doubt, that was our best game of the year, and Saturday's was the poorest we have played since Christmas."

Smith said it would be nice to have a few days to recover from a tournament like the Orange and Black, but the Cowgirls will at least be on their home court tonight as they face the Norton Lady Blue Jays.

Smith said he would like to have the Cowgirls play better than the did when they met the Blue Jays in the first round of the Topside Tip-off in December. Norton won 62-36.

"They handled us very well," Smith said of the first game against Norton. "They gave Colby the closest game they have had in the Topside championship game, losing 56-49.

Cowgirls vs Lady Eagles

Senior Sammie Raymer led the scoring against the Colby Lady Eagles with 10 on 4 field goals and 2 of 3 free throws. Freshman Ashley Archer had 7 on 2 field goals and 3 of 4 free throws. Schields had 3 on 1 field goal and 1 of 2 free throws. Sophomore Erika Gonzales, freshman Jade Herl and sophomore Alexis Bateman each had 2 points.

The Cowgirls shot 36 percent from the floor while the Eagles shot 46 percent. The Eagles out rebounded the Cowgirls 31-20 and had 13 offensive rebounds to 5 for the Cowgirls. Neither team made a three-point shot with the Cowgirls trying six shots and the Eagles trying three shots.

Cowgirls vs Lady Beavers

Archer led the Cowgirls scoring with 19 points, getting 15 of those in the second half. She had 6 field goals and was 7 of 9 on free throws. Raymer had 15 on 1 three-point shot, 3 field goals and was 6 of 7 on free throws. Junior Shelbi Hall had 8 on four field goals and was 0 for 1 free throws. Herl had 7 on 1 threepoint basket 1 field goal and was 2 for 2 on free throws. Gonzales had 4 on 1 field goal and 2 of 2 free throws. for Goodland.


The Cowgirls hit 25 percent of their three-point shots (2 of 8) and 43 percent from the floor (15 of 37). The Beavers hit 10 percent of their three-point shots (1 of 10) and 36 percent from the floor (13 of 36). The Cowgirls hit 81 percent of their free throws (17 of 21) and the Beavers hit 67 percent (10 of 15). The Cowgirls out rebounded the Beavers 26-22.

Cowgirls vs Lady Bison

Raymer and Herl led the Cowgirls with 12 points each against McCook. Raymer hit 4 field goals and was 4 of 6 on free throws. Herl had 2 three-point baskets and 3 field goals. Archer was the third Cowgirl in double figures with 10 on 2 field goals and was 6 for 8 on free throws. Schields had 7 on 1 three-point basket and 2 field goals. Hall had 2 on 2 free throws.

The Cowgirls hit 21 percent of their three-point shots (3 of 14), 37 percent from the floor (11 of 30), and hit 71 percent of the free throws (12 of 17). The Lady Bison hit 46 percent of their three-point shots (6 of 13), 41 percent from the floor (17 of 42), and 73 percent of their free throws (13 of 18). McCook out rebounded the Cowgirls 31 to 20 and had 13 offensive rebounds to 7
